PAINT SWAP SUCCESSFUL

Hundreds of metro area citizens reclaimed storage shelf apace September 18 by recycling their old paint. Given the raw weather conditions, the 1993 Paint Drop "N" Swap was very successful. A cold wind and steady rain did little to reduce the participation as four metro area locations received over 6,100 containers of paint.

Paint experts representing several area paint companies inspected the paint as it arrived at the sites to be sure it could be recycled. The containers were unloaded by volunteers and placed in the "swap ares". Many came seeking paint for their next project. Estimates are one can in four found a new home during the event. Five-gallon containers of house paint and light colored interior latex didn't last very long as many bargain hunters left with their truck loaded. Paint remaining at the end of the day was transported to a storage location for "bulking". Bulking involves combining several cans with similar colors to reduce the number of cans that must Sophir Morris, Omaha's only paint be reprocessed. manufacturer, will blend, recondition, containerize and label the recovered paint. The reclyced paint is distributed to community betterment groups and individuals (if interested, call Dan at 734-6060.).



DON'T BE A VICTIM OF STREET CRIME:

The best defense against street crime is preparation. Here are some tips to help you avoid an attack:

- Don't walk alone.
- Run. Police say odds are in your favor if you run.
- Have a plan in mind for escape from possible attack.
- Wear your purse across your body, next to your side, or under your coat if possible. Better yet, carry essentials in a "fanny pack."
- Carry a pen flashlight, and use it to make sure no one is in the back seat of your car before you enter.
- Let someone know your plans.
- Stay on well-lighted, populated streets. Avoid unfamiliar, deserted places.
- Don't wear headphones. Be aware of noises, footsteps, and voices.
- The best thing to yell when being attacked is FIRE! or HELP, POLICE!
- If you think you are being followed, cross the street. If they still follow you, turn around and look at them. Confrontation may intimidate them. If it doesn't work, run to the nearest streetlight and yell for help.
- If someone demands money, throw the money in one direction and run in the opposite direction.
 The attacker has to decide whether to chase you or go for the money. In most cases, money is the object.
- Carry important phone numbers. The trauma of being a victim may cause you to forget even common information.
- Call police immediately if something does happen.

REUSE SUGGESTIONS

When getting ready to discard domething in your trashcan, take a moment to think, can this item be recycled or reused? Below is a list of alternatives to throwing items away:

- 1. Reuse envelopes with plastic windows or adhesive labels and large manila envelopes by placing a label over the previous address.
- 2. Before discarding newspapers and magazines, check with your co-workers to see if they would like to read them or know of someone who would.
- 3. Before discarding paper and plastic bags, determine if they can be reused.
- 4. Reuse packing material that you receive for those you might be sending out. Old newspaper also makes a good packing material.
- 5. Reuse file folders by placing new labels over the previous ones.
- 6. Recycle aluminium cans and container glass by placing a cardboard box or other container in your office area. Be sure they are reinsed out and all lids and neck rings removed.
- 7. When making copies, use both sides of the paper. Keep a recycling box near the copy maching.
- 8. When drafting correspondence or documents, always use both sides of the paper.
- Letterhead or bond paper that has been printed on one side can be used for writing or printing drafts of correspondence or documents.
- Cut blank-sided paper into quarters for note pad paper.
