Bob Hutton Keeps Mowers Mowing

Gifford Park Neighborhood Tool Lending has been in operation for about three years. Its goal is simple: provide people in our neighborhood the opportunity to rent tools for a nominal fee (mainly to cover maintenance and upkeep costs of tools). Everyone benefits from this program. Many people who live in our neighborhood have no space to store tools or do not have access to certain tools or cannot afford to buy many tools. The neighborhood itself benefits when people use the tools to take care of their home and property. Ladders, rakes, shovels, saws, and garden tools are just some of the tools available in Neighborhood Tool Lending. But lawn mowers have been by far the most popular tool to rent. The cost to rent a mower is \$5, mainly to cover maintenance, which can be high on older mowers especially if a small engine mechanic is needed. But we have Bob Hutton who has been fixing our mowers all along. His expertise and

experience in repairing engines and other mechanical systems is a great asset to our neighborhood. Because of Bob's efforts, this valuable program has continued to be an important part of maintaining our neighborhood's homes and yards by sharing our resources.

You do not have to be a member of the GPNA to take advantage of our tool lending program. The rent for most tools is \$3, and lawn mowers are \$5. Call Today

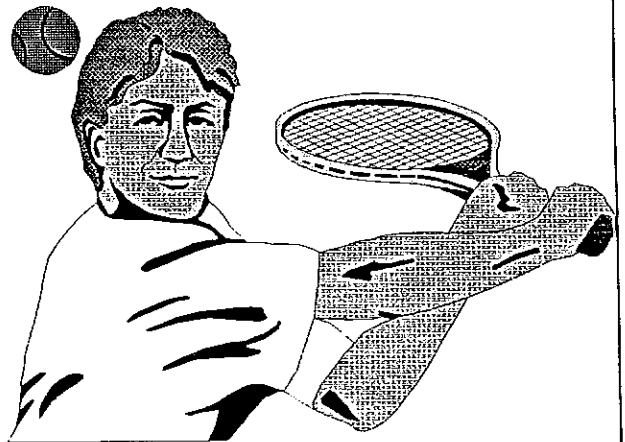

Drills and lessons included running, relay races, gripping the racquet, bouncing the ball, forehand and backhand ground strokes, volleys, serving, hitting against a backboard, and the overall game of tennis. Students in the Hood

We have a lot of university students living in the Gifford Park Neighborhood. Nearly all are good neighbors, but this time of year we always seem to have a few new students that have a difficult orientation period. This usually leads to friction and bad feelings before things are worked out. The purpose of this article is to perhaps avoid some of these misunderstandings.

The first area of difficulty is in the matter of hours. While most homeowners in our neighborhood are asleep by 11:00 PM (earlier for children), most students seem to keep much later hours. If you wonder what keeps the neighbors awake, imagine

how much you would like to hear a party, a car horn, or someone else's music at 6:00 AM. There is hardly anything more irritating than being woken up, so a little consideration in this area will probably avoid the majority of problems.

The second problem area is parties. Besides aggravating the first problem, your guests are rarely as considerate about the neighbors as you are. There is rarely trouble as long as you stay inside and keep quiet when you have friends over, but if your guests are outside and making noise there will be problems. There is another phenomenon that should also be mentioned. On some nights we seem to have a lot of people driving around looking for some entertainment. If you are having a small outside party, you will soon have 50 or 100 new guests. You are responsible for the behavior of all of your new friends, and you can

imagine the usual conclusion of this situation.

The final suggestion is to introduce yourself to your neighbors and give them your phone number. In cases when neighbors are irritated, most would rather not get up, get dressed and come over to exchange words with you. Especially when they don't know you, it is much easier to reach over and dial 911. Both the laws and the police are generally more sympathetic to the homeowners than to you, and if the police should happen to be called twice, they are usually quite unpleasant. If the neighbors know you, they are much more likely to talk to you about these problems.

The Gifford Park Neighborhood is a good place to live for students. It is close to school, rents are reasonable, and the neighborhood is generally quite safe. With a little effort we hope that we will enjoy your year in school and your time with us.
