Historically Speaking...

Johnny Rosenblatt

Johnny Rosenblatt, Mayor of Omaha from 1954-1961, and for whom Rosenblatt Stadium is named, was a Tech High graduate of 1926, and lived in the Gifford Park neighborhood. Johnny's father and mother, Louis and Sarah Rosenblatt and their family of six children lived at 3025 Webster. Louis and Sarah came to Omaha from Russia in 1900 because of the persecutions there. Mr. Rosenblatt peddled baked goods from a horse drawn wagon. Later he worked as a custodian. They first lived at 13th and Davenport, then 23rd and Paul and at 24th and Caldwell. The Webster address was a move up. They were a happy and deeply religious family.

Johnny started working at age 7 as a news boy on the corner of 24th and Farnam. He sold papers for 10 years. His favorite sport was baseball, but he liked football, soccer, basketball and handball too. He won two baseball letters at Tech High and played semi-pro baseball in Omaha until 1935. He spent 10 days as a professional baseball player with the Omaha team in the Western League and played in an exhibition game with Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig in 1927. His full-time job was with Roberts Dairy Company where he was a salesman, advertising manager, wholesaling manager, district manager and general sales manager. One of his duties with the dairy was to participate in civic affairs, and this he did with gusto.

Johnny became chairman of the original baseball stadium committee in 1944. In 1948 he was elected to the city council and became Public Property Commissioner. In 1951 he became Street Commissioner, and in 1954 was selected by the Council to be mayor of the City of Omaha. A new City Charter was adopted in 1957 and Johnny Rosenblatt became the first mayor of Omaha to be elected by the people. He served in this capacity till 1961. The baseball stadium was fittingly named in his honor in 1964.

When Johnny Rosenblatt became mayor, practically the only things west of 72nd Street were cornfields and Boys Town. By the end of his term, rezoning had been approved for the Crossroads shopping center at 72nd and Dodge Streets, construction of Interstate 80 through southwest Omaha had started, and westward development was on its way.

Johnny Rosenblatt died in October of 1979 at the age of 71. He was survived by his wife, Freeda, and son, Steve. Steve Rosenblatt is a past member of the Omaha City Council.

- Every project **Cynde** has organized has been a success



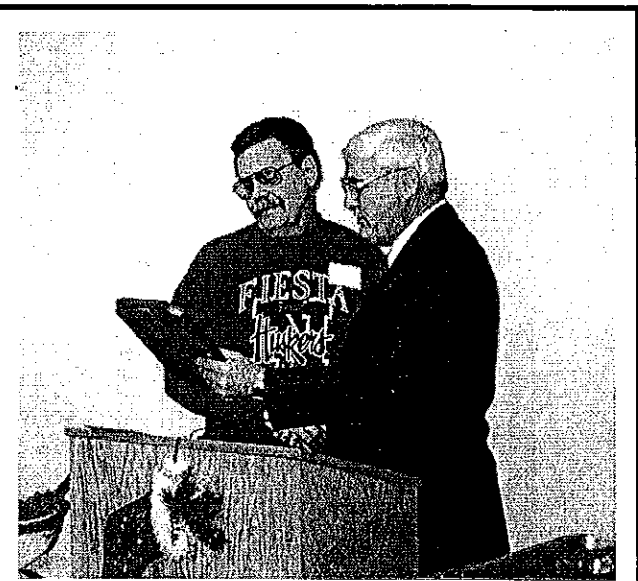

Running a Car Repair Business Out of the Home; Other Businesses Out of the Home; Multiple Families in Single Family Dwelling; Fences - Too High or Facing Wrong Way; Garage Sales; All Other Zoning-Related Complaints; Construction with No Building Permit

Reduce the Opportunity of Burglary

1. Lock all your doors and windows. Install dead bolt locks, pins in your windows, and a peephole in your house.
2. Leave a light burning upstairs and downstairs. Exterior areas of your home should also be lighted.
3. Use a timer to switch lights on and off if you are away.
4. Never leave notes on your house doors for family and friends. Burglars look for easy targets, and a note is a signal that no one is home.
5. Join a neighborhood watch program. Neighbors looking out for each other are the best deterrent to burglary.
6. If you think prowlers are in your home, don't enter. Go to the nearest neighbor, call the police, and watch your home until the police arrive.
7. Valuables should be engraved with an Operation ID Number, which is assigned by the Community Crime Prevention Unit of your local police department.
8. Never open the door to a stranger. Require proper identification.
9. Stop milk, paper, and other deliveries "until further notice," whenever leaving town.
10. Have a neighbor pick up your mail and advertising circulars daily. Also, arrange for lawn care.
11. Keep trees and shrubbery near the house trimmed. Don't give the intruder a place to hide.
12. Have a Home Security Survey completed by your local police department.

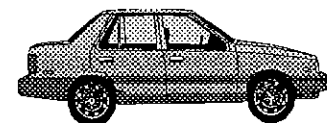

What You Need To Know

The Environmental Quality Division has provided the following information about our garbage, yardwaste and recyclables collection. With the start of the new year it's a good time for all of us to know the rules, which are intended to help each of us, and make Omaha a better, more livable city. Below are resources to receive more information about recycling and solid waste:

General notes:

- Yardwaste collection will start March 31.
- Buildings with less than 5 apartments have normal services.
- Buildings with 5 to 20 apartments have garbage service only for up to 20 trash cans (1 per apartment).
- Buildings with more than 20 apartments must contract their own collection services.
- The only drop-off site operating (as of 1/1/97) is Weyerhaeuser Recycling, 7202 N 16th St, 68112. They are open 24 hours-a-day and can be reached at 453-8755. They accept most recyclables.
- Remember to use clear bags for garbage - DO NOT use dark bags.

- Christmas wrapping paper is OK to recycle.

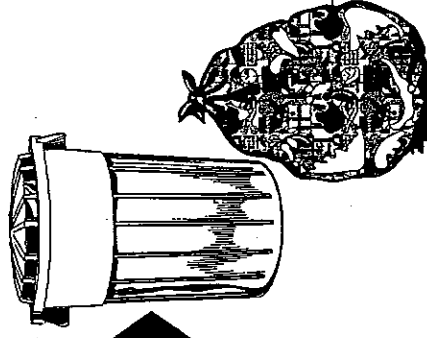

Garbage

- Maximum 32 gallon can; Maximum of 45 pounds.
- Must have tight-fitting lid and secure handles.
- See-through bags only (clear preferred); maximum of 30 pounds.
- Place within 5 feet of curb/alley.
- Maximum of 5 cans and/or bags.

Prohibited Materials

- Mixture of yardwaste and garbage.
- Rock, concrete or dirt.
- Dead animals.
- All liquids.
- Tires, engines or other large auto parts.
- Bulky items (couches, chairs, stoves, etc.)
- Opaque dark plastic bags.
- Motor oil and automotive batteries.

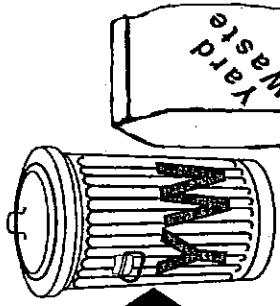

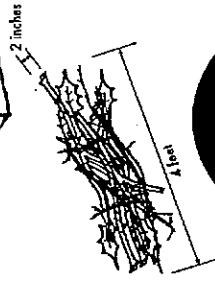
Yardwaste

- Trash can marked with a **YW** or special paper bags.
- Unlimited number of marked cans & paper bags.
- Don't mix garbage and yardwaste together.
- Maximum of 45 pounds.
- Maximum of 32 gallons.



Yes

- Bundle branches & brush, then tie with string or twine. Don't use wire or plastic.
- No pieces larger than 2 inches in diameter.
- Maximum of 4 feet long.
- Maximum of 30 pounds.
- Unlimited number of brush bundles.



Yes

• No plastic bags or boxes.

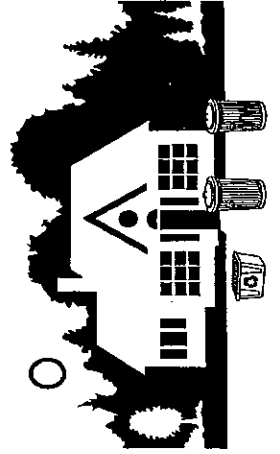
Yardwaste in plastic bags or boxes *will not* be collected.



No

- Place all materials at your collection point by 6AM.
- If your collection was missed, call 444-5238 after 7pm on your collection day.
- Leave a couple feet of space between your yardwaste, recyclables and garbage containers.
- Plastic bags are not collected for recycling and should *not* be used to hold materials in your bin.

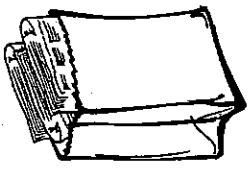

Sack #1—Newspaper

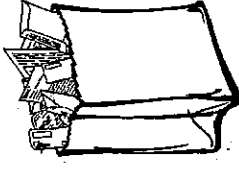
- Includes: Coupons, advertisements, *Parade* section and all paper that came with the newspaper.
- *Do not include:* phonebooks or other paper.
- Lay sack on top of bin.

Sack #2—Mixed Paper

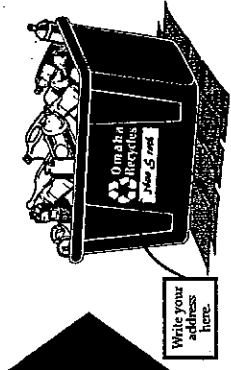
- Includes: Magazines, catalogs, cereal boxes, junk mail (including mailing labels and plastic windows), detergent boxes, office and school paper.
- *Does not include:* pizza boxes, juice boxes, milk cartons, phonebooks, tissue paper, paper plates, or frozen food boxes.
- Lay sack on top of bin.



Yes

Loose in the bin—Containers (Not in plastic bags)

- Plastic bottles marked ♻️, including: Bottles that held pop, cooking oil, mouth wash, shampoo, and cleaners.
- ♻️ *not included:* plastic cups, toys or cookie trays.
- Plastic bottles and tubs marked ♻️, including—bottles and tubs that held milk, juice, cleaners, margarine, whipped topping, and yogurt.
- ♻️ *not included:* motor oil or auto product bottles, lawn chemical bottles, toys or cookie trays.
- Glass bottles & jars.
- Aluminum cans.
- Steel (tin) cans, including—empty aerosol cans, empty and dry paint cans. Tip: Place end (lid) of food cans inside can and crimp closed.
- Corrugated cardboard. Flatten and place on ground under bin.

Recycling Collection Tips

- Write your address on the bin using a permanent marker.
- Remove snap top lids and screw on caps from all containers and place in garbage.
- *Do not include:* plastic bags, Styrofoam®, motor oil bottles, plate glass, syringes, light bulbs, drinking glasses or pizza boxes.
- Flatten all boxes.
- Remove bin from curb as soon as possible after collection.
- All recyclables set out for collection must be in a green bin. (Except large pieces of cardboard that should be placed under the bin)

To purchase a second bin for recycling call 444-5098.

Plastic Containers ♻️ & ♻️

We must all work to be sure that only the correct plastics are collected for recycling. If the wrong type of plastic is included, it will lower the value of the recycled material and will cause problems in the recycling process. Those problems could cause recyclable material to be landfilled, so please be careful what you place in your recycling bin and keep this as a reference.
