If you need a few extra hands to help, let us know so that neighbors can volunteer to help, connect you with tools through the GPNA tool rental program, and publish the results in the newsletter to encourage others to participate. Restore Omaha

Join old-home owners, restoration experts and amateurs, and preservation lovers alike for an opportunity to spend the day networking and gathering ideas, solutions and inspiration for restoring older properties.

The 10th annual Restore Omaha Conference is Saturday, February 28, at Metropolitan Community College's South Campus, 27th and Q Streets. The conference opens with a reception on Friday, Feb. 27 from 7 to 10 p.m. at The Pella, a new event facility inside the former Pella Lutheran Church at 41st and Harney Streets. Saturday's conference runs from 8 to 5 p.m. Keynote speaker is 2014 National Trust for Historic Preservation Award winner Bernice Radle and her husband Jason Wilson. Through Buffalove Development, the couple works to create cool urban spaces in an affordable, sustainable and high-design way. Their organization is bringing new life to properties that were either foreclosed upon or on the brink of demolition in Buffalo, NY.

Fifteen breakout sessions have something for everyone whether you are a developer, architect, owner of an old home or a neighborhood community leader. Topics range from case studies on successful home and building restorations, how to finish older basements, how to use real



estate tools to save historic properties and information on the new state historic tax credits and city code enforcement policy. Breaks provide opportunities to visit with vendors and local craftsmen. It all ends with the Restore Jam, where any attendees are invited to share before-and-after photos of their own restoration project.

Cost to attend both the reception and conference is \$70 (\$50 for conference only, \$25 reception only). Restoration Exchange members receive a discount.

Restore Omaha Conference keynote speakers to talk about Buffalove

Bernice "Buffalove" Radle and her husband Jason Wilson will serve as keynote speakers for the 2015 Restore Omaha conference February 27 and 28, 2015 at Metropolitan Community College's South Omaha Campus. They are 2014 National Trust for Historic Preservation Award winners. Through Buffalove Development, the couple works to create cool urban spaces in an affordable, sustainable and high-design way. Their organization is bringing new life to properties that were either foreclosed upon or on the brink of demolition in Buffalo, NY.

Radle and Wilson love buildings and cities. Their endless enthusiasm, dedication and passion is aimed at historic preservation, neighborhood development and making historic buildings more energy efficient. Radle is a project manager at Buffalo Energy, co-owns Buffalove Development and is very active in Buffalo New York's Young Preservationists and the Northeast Sustainable Energy Association. She has overseen over 150 energy efficiency projects statewide, impacting 24,000 people. Radle and Wilson's Buffalove Development focuses on buying and renovating vacant or underutilized properties in Buffalo. In 2014, they teamed up to film a historic renovation series for HGTV which is set to air in Spring 2015.

Jill Westfall - 2014 Neighbor of the Year

The GPNA honored Jill Westfall as our 2014 'Neighbor of the Year' at the 26th annual GPNA Holiday Banquet. Jill was born in West Des Moines, IA. She moved into the Gifford Park neighborhood in 2003, living at the 'Spirit of Peace' house near 32nd & Webster while attending Creighton where she graduated in 2005. After graduation, Jill left Omaha for a year in the Twin Cities, volunteering with Catholic Charities putting her skills and passion to work advocating for public policy changes for families in poverty and immigrant communities. After a year in Minnesota, she returned to Omaha for a position at Voices for Children in Nebraska where she worked as Communications Coordinator. Last February she changed employers and now works at UNMC at the Behavioral Health Education Center of Nebraska.

Jill's neighborhood involvement is very impressive in a relatively short amount of time. She was GPNA Secretary from 2008-2010, and again 2012 to present. Jill served as Vice President in 2011. Most of you know she has been our GPNA Gifford Park's Pride newsletter editor for the past 3 years and does a GREAT job. In fact the GPNA was one of just a few neighborhood organizations to be recognized last May in Eugene, Oregon at the NUSA (Neighborhoods USA) National Conference for "Outstanding Neighborhood Newsletter." If you think about, over the past 7 years while serving on the GPNA board, Jill has attended more GPNA meetings (general and board) than any other member! She does a ton of work for our Holiday Banquet including planning, invitations, RSVPs, decorating, and more. Other areas Jill has volunteered include the community garden, Block Parties, Bike Rodeos, and of course, the Community Bicycle Project of Omaha (CBPO) from 2006-2011. Her incredible dedication volunteering with the Bike Shop is amazing and includes: early startup and "foundation" work to help get operations off the



ground; fundraising; training; operations; recruiter; working with Creighton Legal Clinic on 501c3 non-profit status and by-laws; CBPO President, Treasurer & Secretary; teaching bike safety and repair; and mentoring youth.

At the banquet, I had the real honor of presenting Jill her special recognition. I always knew she did a huge amount of the "heavy lifting" for the GPNA since she joined the board in 2008, but after gathering her information as I prepared my talk, I was blown away by how much she has done for our neighborhood and the broader community, and all the while working a challenging job. Food Express

On my daily walks I've noticed that most of the Food Express packets are not picked up by residents. I've also noticed that the delivery person doesn't get the hint when they are still laying out a week later, and continues to deliver them. I had previously read on the "Nextdoor Gifford Park" site that a person is supposed to come around a couple of days after delivery to pick up the rejects, but I've only seen this happen once. I have seen up to four weekly deliveries accumulate at some addresses so this pick-up is irregular, at best. To add to the nuisance, in my neighborhood the delivery person rarely gets the packet farther than the sidewalk (rather than getting it into the yard). So they're more of a hazard while walking (and more numerous) than the dog owners that don't clean up after their pets.

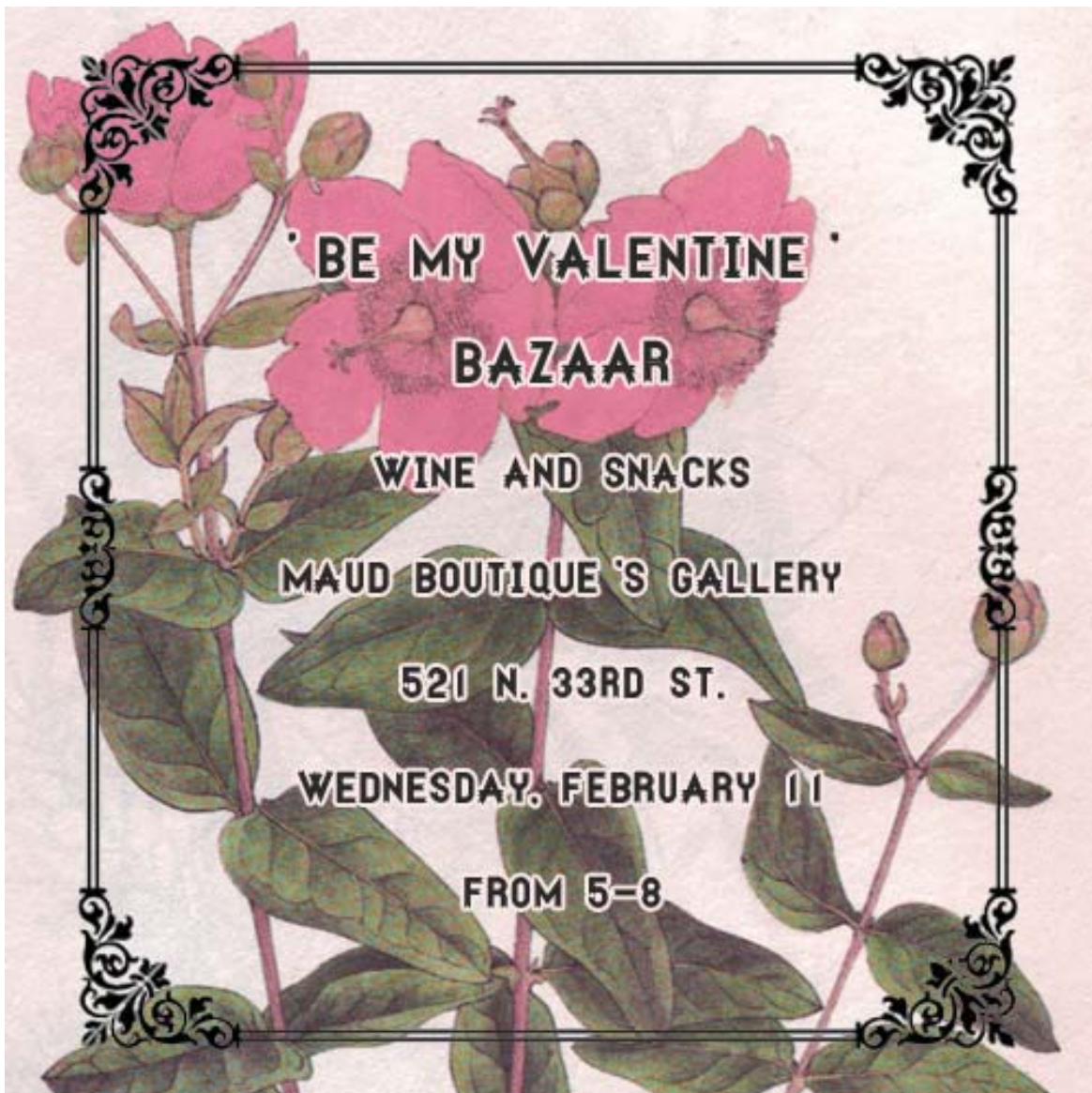

Restore Omaha Keynote
