

DRUG FREE ZONE by Ron Yates

Gifford Park, as well as the entire city, realizes that gangs and drugs are serious problems. We feel that Gifford Park is unique in that our entire neighborhood lies within the one thousand foot drug free zone boundaries since schools such as Yates, Creighton, Nebraska College of Business, Cathedral, Duchesne, and the Teacher and Administrative Center have boundaries which overlap. The Gifford Park area may well be the educational center of Omaha.

It is important that we acknowledge that there is a drug problem and advise visitors that we consider our area to be a

Drug Free Zone. We have prepared decal (3.5"x4") that be displayed on doors, windows. bumpers. and school books. at. homes, businesses and schools. This decal will not solve the drug problem. but



will let people know how the Gifford Park community feels about the illegal use of drugs.

Persons wishing to obtain decals may contact any GPNA officer or member. A \$1.00 donation is being requested to offset the printing costs.

POLICE RIDE ALONG

First, I'd like to thank our Chairman, Jim Windorski for unselfishly relinquishing his seat and inviting me to participate in one of the most successful programs OPD offers. After a brief introduction we were off to the nerve center of the 911 operation. Located two stories below the City-County Building, all of the police, fire, and rescue squads are dispatched. My first impression was the professional attitude and sincere involvement these civilian employees project. The room surprisingly quiet, with low level lighting and if mellow jazz were played in the background, it would not have surprised me.

Next, two of the officers divided our group of four into two groups of two each. After realizing that we were not going to participate in a full-fledged shootout, capture criminals, or make a drug bust, we back while our police settled representative Marlin McClarty taught us several codes used by officers on the The rest of the night (which was a slow night) we drove around trying to focus It didn't take long. in on some action. Several police units were on the scene of a crack-bust when we arrived. We listened to Marlin describe what protocol was used to insure themselves a good case in court.

In my opinion, Officer McClarty is a true professional and is an asset to his department, our city, and to all people in our society whom we constantly depend on to protect our kids and our lives. This ride along program has shown me a new perspective of our fine police department. But also it taught me that police officers have the hardest job in the world.
