All St. Joseph's Hospital asks of us is that we RSVP by November 29th. Thank you St. Joe's...



COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

For the last several months, the Board of the GPNA has met weekly with various representatives of area institutions, including: Creighton University, Boys Town National Research Hospital, St. Joseph Hospital, and Omaha Public Schools. The purpose of these meetings has been to develop a plan among the area institutions and the GPNA to revitalize the GPNA neighborhood. The plan that was proposed to the institutional representatives suggests the creation of a Community Development Corporation briefly outlined as follows:

- 1. Board to consist of GPNA board members and representatives of Creighton University, Boys Town National Research Hospital, St. Joseph Hospital, and Omaha Public Schools;
- 2. Each institution shall provide combinations of grant money, loan guarantees, and loan subsidies.
- 3. Possible projects to be proposed:
 - a. 33rd and California Street commercial store front rehabilitation project;
 - b. Center to provide day care services to area employees and residents;
 - c. Project for orderly student/fraternity and institutional employee housing development;
 - d. Project to provide convenient and adequate parking facilities to service 33rd and California business district;
 - e. Joint venture project between St. Joseph Hospital and the neighborhood laundry or dry cleaners;
 - f. Joint venture project between St. Joseph Hospital and the neighborhood drug store;
 - g. Development of a fifteen (15) year comprehensive expansion plan for the area institutions;
 - h. Implementation of a marketing plan to stimulate private investment; and
 - i. Rehabilitation of 33rd and California Street business district, including sidewalks, diagonal parking, street lights, and landscaping.

At this point, Creighton University and St. Joseph Hospital have approved the basic Community Development Corporation concept. If you have any questions, suggestions, or would like a complete copy of the CDC proposal, contact me or another board member.

WATCHING YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD MAKING A REPORT TO YOUR POLICE DEPARTMENT

The number to call when reporting suspicious activity is <u>911</u>. Give the Police Telephone Operator:

Your name and address

The reason for the call.

The location of the activity.

The description of the suspect and any vehicle involved.

Be sure to make a written note of as many of the below as possible. The Operator may not want all of the information below at the time of receiving the call. Keep the information for the Officer when he arrives.

Do not hang up until the Operator has all the information required and you are told to do so. Description should include:
