2. Must have attended at least 4 GPNA meetings in the past year (June 1 to May 31).

This is an annual tree planting project to beautify the streets of Omaha. It has been developed to help the citizens of Omaha purchase quality trees for planting along the streets. Proper tree placement will create an example for others to follow. Trees provide a buffer from street noise, clean the air, block the wind, and can increase property value as much as 20%. Thus, trees in our City are an invaluable resource which should be constantly renewed.

This is how the program works: Each winter, the Forestry Division takes applications for the planting of several varieties of trees selected for desirability as Omaha will deliver and plant a bare root street tree. This charge covers approximately half the expenses incurred in planting one of these eight to ten foot, bare root trees. There is a limited supply of trees.

Property owners who want a tree or trees planted in the spring of 1991 should fill out and return an application (available from the Forestry Division). After the application is received, and the site is approved, the applicant must then pay \$30.00 per tree to the Forestry Division, City of Omaha. For additional information, contact the Forestry Division (444-5543).
