

One year ago in October and November, I checked the record for crime statistics in our neighborhood for a thirty-day period. There were twenty-three reports in the record.

The good news is that this year during the same time frame, we experienced fifteen. The hot spots seem to be the northeast and southwest areas within the GPNA boundaries. It appears that Webster Street has had five thefts, which is very high for a small area east of 33rd Street. In total there has been one robbery, seven thefts, three burglaries, three DWI, and one shoplifting. Speak to your neighbors and form a Neighborhood Watch Group. Let's reduce this number even further next year.

City of Omaha Reinvestment Area Program (RAP) Seeks Participants

The City of Omaha can provide homeowners non-repayable grants that can reduce your home repair loan by 40%. For example, if you qualify to borrow \$15,000 from one of the several participating banks, the City of Omaha will provide you with a grant for \$6,000 which would be used to reduce the loan amount to \$9,000.

All of the Gifford Park neighborhood falls in the reinvestment area. You must fall below maximum income requirements and be able to qualify for a loan. For more information, call the City of Omaha Planning Department at 444-5153 or 444-5150.

Your Tax Dollars at Work by Ron Yates

Tax dollars were used to rehabilitate the properties at 521 and 523 N. 33rd Street and their physical appearance has greatly improved. Since this has been completed, most of the units are vacant. However, of those units currently occupied, at least some of the residents have questionable career goals (dope dealing, thievery, prostitution, and burglary). These addresses, along with the property just to the north, have been described by a police officer as "burglar's row."

The landlord, the City of Omaha, and Section 8 are being paid by our taxes to integrate our neighborhood with these "professionals." This project is not a success and those who care should be willing to meet with tenants, landlords, the City, Section 8 and other interested parties to improve the area. The police have been to those addresses many times and, with your help, can make things uncomfortable for those residents breaking the law. Be vocal — call the police, mayor, city council, Section 8, and any other agency that has an interest or responsibility. Let's insist that these agencies perform their jobs — the one that we are paying them to do.
