There will be a charge for appliances that contain refrigerant (freon) - this charge has not yet been set. <u>Tree brush will NOT be accepted</u> for the Fall Cleanup...save it for the Spring Cleanup. Because the GPNA pays for these dumpsters, we may require a donation if you have excessive trash (ie. several truckloads) to help fund the cleanup.


# STREET CARS IN GIFFORD PARK NEIGHBORHOOD?

Did you know that our Gifford Park neighborhood business area of 33rd and California had Street Cars? The street car was the only mode of public transportation in Omaha until they were entirely replaced by buses. The first street cars were horse drawn and began in the middle 1860's. Slowly but surely, they finally became electrified around the middle 1880's.

The year was 1902 and a decision had been made by the Omaha Street Railway Company to extend a double track from 25th & California west to 33rd and California then north on 33rd Street to 33rd and Parker Street. This street car line was in operation for thirty nine years. It was finally abandoned late in the year of 1941 (Just before the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor). The street cars that were in use in Omaha were manufactured right here at the "Omaha Shops" located at 26th & Lake Street. These buildings are now used today by the City of Omaha as a truck and auto repair facility.

In the 1930's the line would begin at 33rd & Parker go south 33rd Street to California Street, go east on California Street to 25th Street, go south on 25th Street to Dodge Street, go east on Dodge Street to 16th Street, go south on 16th Street to Leavenworth Street, go west on Leavenworth Street to 60th Street, go south on 60th Street to Woolworth Street, go west on Woolworth Street to 63rd & Woolworth Street, go south on 63rd Street to Shirley Street (in front of Aksarben).

As some of you old timers remember,

both 33rd Street and California Street were brick. Since the 1950's the trend has been to cover the bricks over with asphalt. For many years the bricks on 33rd Street between Cuming and Hamilton were exposed so you could see that the middle of the street was rebricked. Of course this was because the tracks were taken out and sold as scrap.

But some of you remember in the 1950's and 1960's that California Street between 30th and 33rd Street still had the bricks and tracks exposed. When it was time for the city to put asphalt on California Street in the middle 1960's, they did not take the time to take the tracks out, but just covered them over with the asphalt.

Some time take a drive to the Creighton University Campus. There you can get an idea of how California Street might have looked in the 1930's. The location would be about 27th & California Street on the Creighton Campus. You will see California Street bricked with the street car tracks exposed. If you look straight West you will see that so much

has changed. California Street is abruptly cut off at 27th Street and suddenly there is Interstate 480 and Boys Town institute in the way of where California Street and the street car used to go.

If you want to get an idea of what the street cars were like, take a trip to the Western Heritage Museum. Go downstairs to the Omaha Exhibit Area in the lower level and there you will find a restored street car just like the ones that ran in our neighborhood for 39 years. Take the time to get in the street car and inspect it. Use your imagination. You might pretend as you are sitting in one of the seats in the street car, that it is turning on 33rd & California and going North to the end of the line at Parker.
