## City of Omaha, Code Enforcement Violations Chapter 48, Minimum Dwelling Standards Exterior Dwellings



Listed below are some city code violations for dwellings. Be a good neighbor and find out why dwellings are not being kept up to code. Landlords and homeowners are required by law to keep dwellings up to code.

Basement Entry: Missing handrails, deteriorated side-

walks

Chimney: Missing mortar, broken or missing

backplaster

Doors: Not weather tight, not rodent proof

**Down spouts:** Rusty, leaking, deteriorated, or missing **Drain/Grade:** Fill dirt around foundation, fill low spots

in grade

Eaves: Deteriorated, missing, peeling paint Egress/Sidewalk: Cracked, broken, or upheaved Exterior Wall: Peeling paint, missing siding

Fence: Deteriorated wood, collapsing

Foundation: Missing mortar, broken, or missing

backplaster

Gutters: Rusty, leaking, deteriorated, missing

### Ten Commandments of Being A Good Neighbor

We are all familiar with the original Ten Commandments. These if obeyed, can easily be seen to have the effect of providing a smooth and respectful relationship between God, ourselves and others.

Without rules to govern behavior our lives would be chaotic. Consider what rules would apply toward have a pleasant, safe, peaceful and attractive neighborhood in which to live. Of the following, which would you choose to be among your Ten Commandments Of Being A Good Neighbor?

- 1. Though shalt keep thy property in attractive condition by painting, cleaning, mowing, raking and planting.
- 2. Though shalt not let grass weeds and bushes go uncut and untrimmed on your property, the parking or alleys.
- 3. Though shalt not make noise which is offensive to your neighbors such as loud music (others tastes may differ from yours), late parties and vehicles without muffler or having loud exhaust.
- 4. Thou shalt control your children and pets so these are not a nuisance to your neighbors through trespass on their property, or by excessive noise or frequent barking.
- Thou shalt do your share of the work in neighborhood projects such as cleanups, beautification, obtaining city services and enhancing law enforcement..
- 6. Thou shalt not park your vehicles on the grass, or parkings, across driveways and sidewalks or overlong on the street.
- 7. Thou shalt not accumulate unlicensed or inoperative vehicles or parts of vehicles on your property.
- 8. Thou shalt be courageous in reporting violations of laws and ordinances to the police or proper city agencies.
- 9. Thou shalt watch over thy neighbors property when they are gone to prevent loss or damage to them.
- 10. Thou shalt remove snow from walks soon after snowfalls so that pedestrians may have a clear path.
- 11. Thou shalt assist older or handicapped neighbors by lending a helping hand.
- 12. Thou shalt be kind and welcoming to new neighbors.

Which would you choose? They all pretty much boil down to the same thing don't they - being considerate of the rights of others and pulling your share of the load.


