

Home Improvement Programs Available Security National Bank Assisting In Programs



I would like to take this opportunity to update your Neighborhood Association on two special Home Improvement Programs that are available through Security National Bank. They are the Reinvest-

ment Area Program and the 6% Energy Loan Program.

Security National Bank is one of only seven lenders participating in the City Omaha's Reinvestment Area Program (RAP). The RAP Program provides financial assistance to homeowners in specific areas to improve their homes at a lower cost of funds. The RAP Program uses Community Development Block Grant funds to reduce the size of the loan need to improve your home by providing a 40% subsidy. This means that if you intended to do \$10,000 of improvements, you would only need to borrow \$6,000; the City would provide a non-repayable grant for the remaining \$4,000.

Security National Bank also participates in the State of Nebraska's 6% Energy Savings Program. This program provides low cost funds for loans to make qualified energy saving improvements to your home or for the purchase of energy saving appliances.



Ann "Patches" Jernigan Is Neighbor of The Month

Ann "Patches" Jernigan has a message for any one, any age - it's never too late to get an education. "Patches", as most friends know her, is 69 years old and was born and raised in Emporia, Virginia. She started 1st grade at the age of 6 (as there was no Kindergarten then). School went through the 11th grade, which would have been the senior year then, but Patches was just a junior in 10th grade when she got married in 1941 during World War II and could not

complete her ploma. She said her that she was diploma, essister and two



well one day she saw an ad on TV about a correspondence program to earn a high school diploma, not just a G.E.D. Patches started the program in April, 1994 at a cost of \$400. To complete her diploma the program required her to complete 16 required course credits and 5 elective course credits for a total of 21 credit by taking courses through the mail. Well Patches did it in flying colors with an 88% average and finishing up the last course in early October, 1994! She received her high school diploma the day after her 69th birthday, which was on October 23rd. Her framed diploma (with grades) is now proudly displayed in her home. She says her favorite courses were English, Spelling and History.

Speaking of history, Patches has seen more than a few ups and downs in the Gifford Park neighborhood. In 1955, she and her husband Carl came to Omaha and moved to the Hillside Court Apartments, Carl was in the Air Force. They later moved to 3519 Cuming Street Apt #2 and then eventually to 3523 Cuming Street in 1974. Carl passed away in 1979 but Patches still lives in their home on Cuming Street. She was a Girl scout leader for over 30 years and is well known in our neighborhood. Among the many achievements in her life, earning her high school diploma is one of the greatest. Patches, you are an inspiration to all of us, young and old.

Historically Speaking... 33rd and California in the 20's and 30's

The business area of 33rd and California was an important and busy place in the 1920's and 30's. Not that it isn't important today, but at that time neighborhood stores were essential because of lack of transportation and before the advent of large grocery stores, discount stores and shopping malls. 33rd street was the home of Borg's Garage, Bogard's Pharmacy, Al Wohlner Grocery, Nelson-Anderson Grocery, Eptein's Circle Theater, Miller's Bakery, Ideal Bakery, Piggly-Wiggly Grocery, Jack Doss's Cafe, Ted Janerus the Barber, Connie Wilson's California Beauty School, Dr. Curnyn the Dentist, a cleaner, an ice house, a filling station and more. Dog Owner Responsibilities Under City of Omaha Ordinances



By City Ordinance, no dog (even if licensed) is allowed to run or roam free on any yard or private property of others or on public places such as alleys, sidewalks and streets.

Every dog owner is completely responsible for keeping their dog confined to their own private property by a chain or similar method of enclosure.

No person shall let their dog bark, yelp, or howl in a loud, frequent or continuous manner. This type of interference with the peace and comfort of a neighborhood by a dog is specifically prohibited.

No person owning or keeping a female dog in season shall house such a dog in a way which results in attracting other animals to linger about and cause a nuisance.

Any person that owns, keeps, or harbors any dog ... must purchase a license yearly. This does not apply to any dog under two (2) months of age.

Every dog required to be licensed must be vaccinated against rabies annually. Young dogs must be vaccinated within thirty (30) days after they reach two (2) months of age.

For complaints regarding barking dogs, sick/injured or stray animals, and animal bites, contact the Humane Society at 444-7800.

Processing of basic tax returns and possibly electronic filing will be available on the dates listed below. Walk-in appointments are welcome, but priority will be given to those who call first to schedule an appointment. A big thanks to I.R.S. volunteers Jackie Foster, Kathy McDonald and Jan Bostick who helped 8 people (5 by electronic filing) on February 4th and 6 people (3 by electronic filing) on February 11th. They were able to electronically file these returns with the aid of a laptop computer. Free tax help will be available at the GPNA Office on the following Saturdays:

City of Omaha Maintenance Department Stays Busy



Jerry Flood, Superintendent of City Maintenance for Omaha, spoke at the Februrary meeting and shared some interesting facts:

- There are 175 city parks occupying 9,000 acres.
- The Maintenance Deptartment has 130 permanent employees.
- They handle mowing, trimming, repair, trash removal, mowing on private property (in event of weeds & litter violation).
- Received over 10,000 complaints last year for various problems and code violations.
- More services are now subcontracted to private companies.
- The annual budget is \$6.5 million.
- Average annual utility bills: electric \$600 thousand, water - \$200 thousand, gas - \$150 thousand.

Jerry has worked for the City of Omaha for 23 years. He and his department have always treated the Gifford Park neighborhood very well. Thanks Jerry!

Neighborhood Observations

I often walk around the neighborhood. usually back and forth to my job at Creighton. I would like to tell you how I have increased my aerobic capacity, lost 100 pounds and turned my life around. but that would not be very true. In fact I walk mostly just because I like to be outside. Walking has a lot to recommend it. It is good fresh air low impact outdoor exercise, and it requires zero equipment (except feet and legs). Our neighborhood is well suited to walking as there are plenty of sidewalks. If you walk north or south it is fairly flat, and an east - west excursion will give you a little more workout on the hills. The sidewalks are in fairly good repair, although apparently not good enough for the joggers who still seem to prefer the streets. To me, snow clearing seems better than in the past although there are always a few regulars who would rather wait for spring than pick up a shovel. Another irritation is people who park their cars across the sidewalk. This really bothers me when I see the kids having to go into the street on their way back and forth from school, all because someone is too inconsiderate to pull into their driveway or park on the street. Overall though, walking in our neighborhood is quite pleasant.

Now that the days are getting longer and the weather is mild, you may decide to shut off the tube and pull on your sneakers. You can walk up to 38th and see how the members of the Joslyn Castle Neighborhood Association live. There is fine view from 38th and California and a few more steps west will take you to the Cathedral. A walk nearly anywhere in he neighborood interesting reveal some architecure. If you have kids, you can take them to the playground at Gifford Park or cross Cuming St. to the playground in Bemis Park. You could also take your tennis racket and visit the courts at Gifford or Duchesne. Instead of firing up the old thunderbomb for a minor shopping trip, your feet can even take you to one of our fine 33rd Street businesses. Finally, you can visit someone you haven't talked to for a while.

Perhaps we'll even meet.
