## Gifford Park Neighborhood Cleanup Shows No Mercy

There's no doubt about it, the Gifford Park Cleanup Crew gets the "most tonnage value" of any cleanup effort around. If the statistics don't prove it, then maybe if you saw the large hole in the intersection at 34th & Davenport, this would convince you. The incident happened at our last Spring Cleanup, Saturday, April 15th in Gifford Park. The street collapsed about 2 p.m. under the sheer weight of dumpster trucks and neighborhood volunteer trucks hauling trash. Our dumpster monitors may have contributed to the weight of the dumpsters - they worked hard to pack the dumpsters efficiently, wasting little space which added weight to the dumpsters. Also, a short time before this incident, a City of Omaha dump truck experienced an engine breakdown in Gifford Park while handling dumpster overflow. Another truck was quickly sent to the rescue and the cleanup continued. That's proof that our cleanups show no mercy! But seriously, the only casualties were the street and the truck, no one was hurt in either incident.

Again the cleanup crew did a tremendous job of hauling trash for neighbors, cleaning yards, parks, streets, and the business district; separating recyclable items; and packing the dumpsters. The weather was very pleasant as the day began with our annual Easter Egg Hunt and volunteers were rewarded with hot dogs and pop at lunch time. Below is a recap of the cleanup:

- filled 10 dumpsters and 3 city dump trucks
- · recycled 6,000 lbs of metal
- · recycled over 20 tires
- sold many garage sale items
- sold 18 memberships
- collected over \$600 in donations, memberships, and salvage material
- · ate 200 hot dogs and drank 6 cases of pop

It is obvious that this is an important event for our neighborhood and other neighborhood organizations throughout the city, we certainly hope the Spring Cleanup remains a high priority for the City or Omaha for years to come. The reason the cleanup is successful in Gifford Park is because of our experienced volun-



### Historically Speaking... California Beauty School

The area of 33rd and California had the best coiffed women in Omaha from about 1916 to 1952 because 521 North 33rd was the home of Mrs. Kathryn (Katie) Wilson's California Beauty School. Young and not-so young ladies of that time sported tight finger waves and lovely marcels courtesy of the students at the school. Classes of 35-40 students, both men and women, attended Beauty School for nine months. Tuition in the '30s was \$100 and included white uniforms. Many of the students were from Omaha, but some came from outstate Nebraska and other states. Some worked for their room and board in Omaha homes. They practiced on each other as well as the neighborhood ladies.

The California Beauty School was advertised as the "oldest beauty school west of Chicago." (Capital Beauty School was not established until 1923.) Mrs. Wilson was born in St. Joseph, Missouri, April 1, 1870 and died in Omaha in 1952. She married Alphonso Wilson in 1896 and published a textbook, The Successful Hairdresser, in 1925. She was a petite black woman, and to reach the status of owner and operator of such a prestigious beauty school serving mostly white students was an exceptional accomplishment. Graduates of her school included some of Omaha's finest beauticians. It is recorded that at least one student went to Hollywood.

The days of 35 cent shampoos and waves, 50 cent marcels, and \$2.50 permanents (using those awful machines) have come and gone, but Mrs. Kathryn Wilson's California Beauty School deserves a place in the history of Omaha and in particular, the history of 33rd and California.

### GPNA Offers Many Opportunities To Get Involved And Make A Difference

Below is general information about current GPNA standing committees and elected officers along with a brief description of each. Some committees are more active than others, but all committees offer opportunities to get involved in your neighborhood. Everyone is encouraged to bring his or her talents to the GPNA.

**Budget and Finance -** Develop ideas to raise funds for GPNA, apply for grants.

CDC (Community Development Corporation) - Develop master plan for entire neighborhood, improve/create new businesses.

Cleanup - Neighborhood cleanup (specifically Spring and Fall cleanups), organize volunteers and cleanup events.

Courtesy - Send cards, flowers, letters, thank yous, etc. for special occasions and events.

Membership - Update and maintain membership data, print lists and labels. Newsletter - Gifford Park's Pride is our neighborhood newsletter done every month. We need people to write articles in the following categories: history, current events, upcoming events, recognition, editorials. We also need help with distribution of news-

letters (every other month only).

Office - The GPNA office is located next to J'N'J Grocery - 532 North 33rd Street. Office to be kept clean, organized, and time scheduled for community usage.

Park - Gifford Park beautification, improvements, park master plan, communication with City Park Maintenance Department.

Program - Schedule guest speakers for GPNA meetings. Also organize other events (i.e. Holiday Lighting Contest). Public Relations - Communication with media - newspaper, TV, radio; any news items affecting our neighborhood.

Social - Organize or help with social events (i.e. Christmas banquet, Gifford Park Day).

Tool Lending - Rents tools, mowers, etc. to neighborhood people for a nominal fee. Areas of need: Space to store items (mainly mowers).

VIP (Volunteer Incentive Program) - Recognition and awards for outstanding participation in the neighborhood.

Weeds and Litter - Document and report code violations/problems of properties, communication with City officials. Youth Activities - Organize or help with any youth activities (i.e. Easter Egg Hunt, Pumpkin Patch, Tennis, etc.)

Watch Group - Neighborhood watch group that observes and reports suspi-

cious activities by driving and/or walking in Gifford Park neighborhood.

#### **GPNA Elected Officers:**

President - Oversees and directs all functions of GPNA.

Vice President - Backup to President. Recording Secretary - Takes minutes at general meetings and executive board meetings.

Corresponding Secretary - Handles all neighborhood mail and correspondence.

Treasurer - Handles financial accounting for GPNA.

Executive board is made up of all GPNA officers and committee chairpersons. Board meetings are the third Thursday of each month at 6:30 pm at the GPNA office, anyone is welcome.

Anyone wishing to participate in the GPNA in any way can call any of the numbers listed on page two of this newsletter. Whether you are a student, teacher, professional, retiree, homeowner, renter, landlord, business owner, employee, young or old, this is your neighborhood and there are many opportunities for you to make a difference in your neighborhood.

We have a long list of activities and projects that have been done and another list of things that need to be done.
