

While Officer Jimmy Wilson, Jr. is at the front door of Heaven, may his killers find the back door of Hell.


The Shelterbelt Theater: New Players in the Neighborhood

At the July 20 GPNA Board Meeting, Eric O'Brien, who is the Marketing and PR Director of the Shelterbelt Theater Group, approached the board about supporting the Shelterbelt's application for a Class C liquor license. He feels a liquor license will draw a larger crowd to the shows and thereby improve the economic viability of the business. He pointed out that the clientele who come to the theater/entertainment house are young, educated professionals who have an interest in the arts, and that their presence would be good for the business district of the Gifford Park Neighborhood. The board approved Eric's request.



I interviewed Eric at the Shelterbelt one night, while The Main Stream Jazz Quintet rehearsed in the background. (Main Stream plays at the Shelterbelt Tuesday nights a 9:00). I asked Eric if he'd gone before the City Council yet for the license. He told me that the application is in the hands of the State Liquor Commission and that after they review it, it will be forwarded to the City Council. Eric believes it will be approved. "Chuck [Kilgore] has a lot of connections, and he's been an upstanding member in the community for a long, long time. Plus, I think I can portray myself as an upstart, young entrepreneur, which I think the City Council will find attractive. Also the fact that all of us [the Shelterbelt staff] live and work in this neighborhood and are trying to do something here that is so novel for this part of town."

Eric graduated from Creighton Prep in 1988, then went to Kansas City to attend Rockhurst College, where he studied Philosophy and Theater. In 1992 he returned to Omaha and held a variety of jobs: "I've done everything from marketing to telemarketing—in really lean times—commercial voice-over work, professional acting, and banking."

Eric stumbled into acting purely by accident when he was at Creighton Prep, an all-boy's school. "There weren't a whole lot of chances to meet women. You see a girl at prep and the whole joint lights up. A bunch of girls were auditioning for this play, so I walked in and picked up a script." He found himself doing theater in high school. In college he continued acting because he thought it would be a nice way to meet people. "I always used it for another end." Back in Omaha, while working for a marketing firm, a friend said, "let's go audition for a play," so he did. It just sort of snowballed from there," Eric said. "Now, I find that I go for more than a month

GPNA Tennis Program Ends With Carnival for Kids



Dawg T-shirts were donated by the City of Omaha. We also drew names for two tennis racquets.



The tennis backboard in Gifford Park has just been expanded from eight feet to sixteen feet wide. This will significantly increase the ability to keep a "rally" going with the additional surface hitting area. Ed Hendershot, Tom Rose and Ron Yates erected the backboard in about an hour and a half. The materials came to only \$150 thanks to Micklin Lumber and Ideal Hardware. Micklin Lumber gave us a good deal on treated lumber. Ideal Hardware helped us out on excellent quality paint. without it and I start to get really kind of antsy, unhappy. It has really become the primary focus of my life." Eric did shows at The Firehouse, The Playhouse, The Chanticleer in Council Bluffs, and started a company called SNAP Productions. Then he became involved with The Shelterbelt.

The Shelterbelt Group started two years ago when an Omaha playwright named Scott Working wrote a two-act called V of Geese. Unable to find a theater to stage it, he decided to stage it himself. One day he wandered into Kilgore's Sandwich Shop and asked if he could do his play there. Scott and his actors performed on Friday and Saturday nights for two weekends, just like a band would. Chuck kept the money from food and beer, and Scott kept the money from ticket sales. The play was a great suc-

cess. Scott and his actors, who called themselves The Shelterbelt Theater Group, decided to stage another play, a series of David Mamet sketches called, in its entirety, All Men are Whores. That's when Eric came aboard.

When Chuck announced he was going to close the sandwich shop, The Shelterbelt approached him about managing the facility themselves. Six months ago Kilgore's closed, and The Shelterbelt opened.

The primary purpose of The Shelterbelt is to perform original plays, mainly by Omaha playwrights. To bring in alternative income, there is also jazz on Tuesdays, poetry on Wednesdays, and folk music on Thursdays.

Eric's vision for the Shelterbelt is that the group perfect its craft well enough to play throughout the region, at schools and other auditoriums.

The next production at the Shelterbelt is two one-acts, written by The Shelterbelt's sister theater group in Manhattan. The plays are called "On Angel Food" and "Condo in Vegas." They are directed by Jessica Buster and will run Fridays through Sundays from September 8-24.

Eric views The Shelterbelt as a way to give something back to the community, and the neighborhood. "You know all the old clichés about self-expression and positive social change, but in a way, they're really true. 'Cause this is my way to present a take on life that maybe folks don't get a chance to see."

Historically Speaking...A Family Affair

For the Siracusano's it was a familv affair in the 33rd and California business district from about 1912 to 1973. Both Mr. and Mrs. Joe Siracusano were born in Sicily but met and married in Omaha. Joseph was a shoemaker by trade and Lucia was a baker. In Sicily Lucia mixed her bread at home. baked it in the village ovens and sold it to the store. Joe and Lucia never returned to their home-land believing that they had made their mark as Americans and this land is where they should stay.

In Omaha, Joseph set up his shoe repair shop, Eagle Shoe Shop, at 3222 1/2 California with an apartment in the rear for the family. There were five children: Carl, an artist; Al, the barber; Sam and Jim,

the bakers; and their sister, Virginia, who helped in the bakery until she moved to Minneapolis.

Sam and Jim learned the baking trade at Technical High School and. together with their mother, opened the bakery on the south side of California at 3225. It was called the Nebraska Bakery. Sam and Jim would come to work at 3 or 4 o'clock in the morning seven days a week to make the day's Vienne bread, their specialty; pan bread; sweet rolls; cake; and more. Siracusana ran the store in the front part of the building. Al also attended Tech High and studied barbering. He had his own shop on 33rd street.

Meanwhile Joseph repaired shoes. and even made custom shoes for certain patrons. Business was good since nearly everyone at that time had their shoes repaired many times. On the side. Joe invested in real estate, buying the Melrose apartments and other duplexes in the area.

When World War II came, Sam and Jim went to war and Mrs. Siracusano kept the bakery going by buying her baked goods from Ortman Baking Co. When the boys came home from the war they expanded the bakery into the adjoining building and renamed the store, "Master Pastry Shoppe." They continued baking until early 1973 when they decided it was time to help their dad with his properties.

Mrs. Siracusano died in 1967 and Mr. Siracusano died in 1973. They had either 14 or 17 grandchildren. Their legacy to the 33rd and California business district is their example of hard, honest, and determined work. They started with nothing but determination, and made success of their lives and that of their family members.

(Note: The Siracusano's no longer own property in this area.)
