City Expands Spring Cleanup

This year's Spring Cleanup, called the "Cleanup Omaha Program", will be expanded in several areas to give everyone the opportunity to participate. As in the past we will have a Spring Cleanup day for our neighborhood. (The date for our neighborhood's cleanup will be set after April 1st). Events planned are Neighborhood Cleanup, Dumpsters in Gifford Park, Recycling, Picnic in the Park and Membership Drive. Once again the City of Omaha will provide us with dumpsters in Gifford Park and operate several chipper sites for tree brush. The focus of the Spring Cleanup is for everyone to cleanup and beautify our yards, streets, alleys, parks and vacant lots. Make the effort to get your neighbor involved and offer to help. The GPNA will have trucks and volunteers on cleanup day.

The specific areas that will be expanded as part of "Cleanup Omaha" are as follows:

- There will be five dates this year instead of three for neighborhoods to choose from to reserve dumpsters.
- Seven satellite sites will be open to anyone on two Saturday's April 13 and April 20, 9 a.m. 3:30 p.m. The nearest locations are Park Maintenance Headquarters (1523 South 24th Street), Elmwood Pool Parking Lot (606 South Happy Hallow Blvd.) and Public Works Yard (2601 Lake Street). Items NOT accepted at these sites are yard waste, hazardous materials (paint, herbicides, etc.), tree brush and tires.
- There will be a Recycling Center open for all citizens at Ak-Sar-Ben (63rd & Center Street) each Saturday from April 13 May 25, 9 a.m. 3:30 p.m. Items accepted: metal, appliances, batteries, reuse items for Goodwill and Salvation Army, magazines, glass, plastic #1 & #2, aluminum and ferrous metal, cardboard and newsprint/newspaper. Tires will be accepted but there will be a small fee.
- Adopt A Lot/Community Garden: The City will provide a dumpster at a vacant lot to be cleaned by the Neighborhood Association, and with the owner's permission, the City will till the location providing a "community garden".
- Branching into neighborhoods, is a new street tree planting program. The City will furnish planted trees to neighborhoods at no cost to residents. Planting will start April 1.
- Curb & Street Sweeping is planned for our neighborhood the week of May 13-19. The Public Works Department asks that

The Bolin Boys

Folks living around 34th and California in the 1930's knew all about the Bolin boys. They were the boys with the soapbox car powered by a loud motor that disturbed many a peaceful day or evening as it rattled down driveways, alleys and streets. These same boys were also interested in the new medium of radio. Brother George became a ham operator and, of course, couldn't keep his twin brothers. Howard and Richard, away from his set. parents, Veda and Clarence Bolin, were apologetic and long-suffering. Clarence was a highly qualified auto and motor mechanic and an amateur photographer.

From out of this background Howard Bolin honed his skill and knowledge of radio and, eventually, TV, until he was able to open his own store on 33rd Street-American Radio and TV. He first located on the west side of 33rd next to the Hinky Dinky store, and then in about 1951, he moved across the street to 529 N. 33rd, the present location of Welling Electronics Service Co. Howard was blessed with the knack of "fixing things". His expertise was radio repair and this developed into TV repair. He also sold radios and television sets. His shop was a popular place to view programs in the days before every home had one, or two, or three. These viewers became customers for Howard's radios and TVs. Business was good. Howard was married, had two daughters, and bought a home at 35th and California, but his health failed and he died in October of 1959. The shop was bought by it's present owners.

Neighbor of the Month, Terry Wilwerding

Some of the following information was taken from the article 'Terry Wilwerding named Distinguished Graduate' printed in the Catholic Voice.

St. Cecilia Cathedral Elementary School considers Dr. Terrence (Terry) M. Wilwerding to be one of its distinguished graduates and the National Catholic Educational Associations agrees. It has named him one of the recipients of the 1996 NCEA Catholic Elementary School Distinguished Graduate Award. The award was given February 2nd.

We in the GPNA know Terry's accomplishments and involvement in many of our neighborhood's activities including neighborhood cleanups, GPNA Watch Group, newsletter contributor, weeds & litter, youth activities and being a good neighbor. But you may not know the extent of his involvement outside of the GPNA. Terry's community service has been nothing short of inspiring:

Terry graduated from St. Cecilia in 1966 and from Creighton Prep in 1970. He went on to Creighton University and received his doctorate from the Creighton University Dental School in 1977. He is currently an associate professor and chair of the Department of Fixed Prosthodontics at Creighton's Dental School.

He has been a participant in Big Brothers, Big Sisters since 1978 and was named Big Brother of the Year in 1984. He has volunteered with the Francis House Maintenance Committee since 1987 and in 1990 received its Outstanding Volunteer Award. Vehicle maintenance continues to be a service project for him. He was active in the Salvation Army Tree of Lights Christmas Drive in 1983 and 1984 and served as director of the men's division 1985. He gave service to Latin American concern from 1986-89. He served on the board of directors of the Indian Chicano Health Center since 1993 and is currently treasurer. He has also served as a mentor at Field Club School and Sacred Heart School, and as assistant scoutmaster and now troop committee chairman of Boy Scout Troop 100.

Terry was elected to the St. Cecilia Board of Education in 1978 and stayed until 1991, serving as secretary, vice president and president along the way. He has also been elected to the Cathedral Parish Council twice, and the Cathedral Finance Board. In 1991 he became a member of the Omaha Archdiocesan Board of Education. In 1993 he served as vice president and in 1995 he was elected president.

Bonnie Pryor, principal at St. Cecilia, summed it up best - "In his docile and unassuming manner, Terry has been able to motivate and inspire others to reach their goals regardless of the challenge, and he is an asset to the Omaha community." Congratulations Terry!
