

Historically Speaking... The Grass Shack

For 17 years, from 1947 to 1964, the Grass Shack at 3229 California was a "home away from home" for many students at Creighton University. At the same time it was a good place for a quick lunch or dinner for the bread man, the Pepsi man, the grocer down the street and students on their way home from Tech High. Jack and Alice Kaya opened the cafe about three years after their release from an internment camp for Japanese Americans in Jerome, Arkansas. Prior to WW II the Kayas had been living in Los Angeles where Jack had a 10-cent Cafe and where Alice attended a fashion design school. In Omaha Jack, an excellent cook, first worked in the kitchens at the Blackstone Hotel, but soon found a building for his own cafe on 33rd and California. There were living quarters to the rear for the family and for Alice to do her dress making and alterations. Alice had already gained many customers from Mutual of Omaha and word spread that she was very good.

The Grass Shack was one of the first Japanese restaurants in the Omaha area. Hawaiian and other oriental students at Creighton were some of the best customers. These men and women lived in rooming houses and apartments in the area and depended on Jack and Alice Kaya for cooking to their tastes and pocket books. Mrs. Kaya recalls that many times the students would have to put their very modest meal checks on the "cuff" until their loans or money from home would come in. She said that without fail they paid up as soon as they could.

The Grass Shack served breakfast, lunch and dinner, using a lot of rice. This was relatively inexpensive and, in fact, many of their dinners cost only 55 cents. In spite of very small profits and with the help of Alice's sewing they routinely closed for two weeks each summer so the Kaya family could drive to a lake in Minnesota for a week of fishing and relaxation and, on their return, a week of cleaning and preparation for the next season. They made a change of location to Countryside Village where they opened as the Mt. Fuji Inn in about 1964. They later moved to 7215 Blondo where the Mt. Fuji Inn is still in operation opening each evening at 5 o'clock. The Kayas had four children and now have five great grandchildren. Mr. Jack Kaya died in 1982 and now a daughter, Jackie Shindo, is the manager with help from her mother, Alice.

Response of 911 Call

On Saturday, April 20th, 1996, I called 911 at approximately 11:55 p.m. to report two very large and noisy parties. Both of these parties, located at 201 N. 36th Street and 3320 California Street, were observed by Watch Group members. Several violations were noticed including, but not limited to, M.I.P., parking violations, drunk driving, noise, open containers, littering, public urination and it also appeared that they were charging admission at 201 N. 36th Street. The 911 operator, later identified as #32, advised me that they would be "sending several officers to both locations". The usual response is it may be up to two hours before they can send a car. Not having seen a car or hearing a dispatch by 2 a.m. I can only assume that this operator was trying to be cute.

The Gifford Park Watch Group has over 4,000 hours of volunteer service and we do not make frivolous calls. To be treated this way by someone who will not prevent as much crime in his entire career as we can in one week-end just by being there, was uncalled for and unnecessary. With recent increases in our neighborhood of street people, gangs, graffiti, and gun fire, Operator 32 needs to be trained on how to field calls or consider choosing another career, perhaps entertaining at a comedy club.

parks and vacant lots. Make the effort to get your neighbor involved and offer to help. The GPNA will have trucks and volunteers on cleanup day.

- Four satellite sites will be open to anyone on EACH Saturday in May, 9 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. The nearest locations are Park Maintenance Headquarters (1523 South 24th Street), Elmwood Pool Parking Lot (606 South Happy Hallow Blvd.) and Public Works Yard (2601 Lake Street). Items NOT accepted at these sites are yard waste, hazardous materials (paint, herbicides, etc.), tree brush and tires.
- There will be a Recycling Center open for all citizens at Ak-Sar-Ben (63rd & Center Street) EACH Saturday in May, 9 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. Items accepted: metal, appliances, batteries, reuse items for Goodwill and Salvation Army, magazines, glass, plastic #1 & #2, aluminum and ferrous metal, cardboard and newsprint/newspaper. Tires will be accepted but there will be a small fee.
- Tree brush and branches no larger than 6" in diameter must be taken to one of the following chipper sites between 9 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. on EACH Saturday in May:

Levi Carter Lake Boathouse Parking Lot 13th & Cornish Boulevard

Spring Lake Park **Parking Lot** 14th & I Streets

• Curb & Street Sweeping is planned for our neighborhood the week of May 13-19. The Public Works Department asks that residents sweep down their driveways and sidewalks to assist them in retrieving sand, gravel and salt from entering our sewer waste stream.
