# National Night Out is August 6th



The 13th Annual "National Night Out" will be held on Tuesday, August 6th. It is expected to be the largest ever involving over 28 million people from over 8,800 communities. This annual community-building campaign is designed to heighten crime/drug awareness; generate

support for and participation in local anti-crime efforts; strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community relations; and send the message to criminals that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

When neighborhoods experience the pain and threat that ongoing criminal activity brings, there is usually no easy or simple solution. It takes neighbors working together, watching out for one another and cooperating with law enforcement officials. This is the message that this event is intended to send.

National Night Out is an excellent opportunity to become involved in your neighborhood, to activate your Neighborhood Watch Group and make a difference in your neighborhood that will last all year long.

The Omaha Police Department urges all Omaha residents to participate by becoming involved in outdoor activities between 6 p.m. and 8 p.m., and by turning on their outside lights between 8 p.m. and 10 p.m. Examples of activities that groups have found to be successful are pot luck suppers, parades, skits, carnivals, ice cream socials, watermelon feeds, picnics, etc. Neighborhood fun and involvement by all age groups are important.

The theme for this year's National Night Out is "Give Neighborhood Crime and Drugs a Going Away Party."

# Good News About Good People...Purse Snatcher Nabbed

While paying his debt to society, Mark Andersen may have paid a little extra. Andersen was on a work-release project when he and another witness helped police catch an alleged purse-snatcher. While taking a break from working on a home at 3202 California St., Andersen said, he heard neighborhood resident Margaret V. Campbell, 68, shouting and saw a younger woman walking away with a purse. He jogged after her and cornered her in a lot off an alley. The woman surrendered the purse and left. But Andersen said that when Margaret's son checked the purse and found money missing, Andersen and another witness chased the woman again and brought her back to police officers. Police said the purse-snatcher had \$76 in cash. The incident happened at about 3 p.m. Sunday, July 7, at 33rd and California Streets. She was booked for misdemeanor assault and obstructing an officer. Andersen has been on work release since April and works as a builder. Andersen said he was concerned about leaving his work site. "I'm on work release," he said. "I didn't know what I could and couldn't do." Brien Hendrickson, assistant warden at the work-release center in Omaha, said Andersen's actions were "a wonderful, wonderful, humanitarian thing to do." Mark, the GPNA appreciates your efforts.

## What's Happening in the Neighborhood...

Phase I of our street repair project is progressing nicely and will be completed soon. Curb replacement and asphalt resurfacing have now been completed for most of the construction area. Phase II is planned to cover the area east of 33rd from California to Cuming.

# Parking, **Again**



The Omaha Police have expressed an interest in better enforcing the parking and vehicle laws in the Gifford Park Area, and they have asked for our help. As usual, we see a lot of vehicles parked across the sidewalk, which is not only illegal but inconsiderate of both pedestrians and especially the kids who play up and down the sidewalks in the summer. Cars cannot be parked on unpaved areas between the sidewalk and street. Paved areas between the sidewalk and street must display a current sign that signifies that the area is leased from the city for parking. Parking in unpaved front yards is also prohibited. And like the weeds of summer, the neighborhood has sprouted a large number of unlicensed vehicles, both driven and parked outdoors in yards. The men in blue have said that they are going to step up enforcement, and they have asked us for addresses of vehicles violating the above laws. If you have a problem vehicle in your neighborhood, call me and I will forward a list to the police contact person. Vehicle violations are not only a safety problem, but they detract from the appearance and environment of our neighborhood.
