Historically Speaking... Raymond John Caffrey

The 1930's were characterized by stories of mobsters, corruption in the cities, and armed bank robberies. A Gifford Park resident played an important but deadly part in a Kansas City bank robbery story. He was Raymond J. Caffrey, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. E.F. Caffrey, lived at 815 North 35th Street, and whose aunt, Mrs. J.E. Kirchner, lived at 3431 Webster Street. Ray attended Creighton University from 1920-1925 and after a job as credit manager of Beddeo's Clothing Store in Omaha, passed his bar exam and practiced at Bradenton, Florida, before joining the FBI. He was the third agent in FBI history to be killed in the line of duty. Caffrey had been stationed in Omaha but had just been transferred to Kansas City when the following took place (this is taken from an article in the Omaha Sun, June 19, 1980, by H. W. Becker):

For Your Information... Eastern Nebraska Office on Aging

Eastern Nebraska Office on Aging (ENOA) is one of 670 area agencies created by Congress under the Older American Act to serve the elderly population. ENOA serves families in 5 counties including Douglas, Sarpy, Dodge, Cass, and Washington counties. A continuum of services are available to preserve the dignity and independence of each older individual. These services help to meet health, nutritional, and social needs. In most cases, in-home services are recommended by state-certified case managers which support the frail older person's desire to stay at home. Case Mangers can conduct a health and social assessment, design a plan of care, contact other agencies on the older person's behalf, monitor services being provided, and coordinate services with other agencies as needed. Cost of services vary, but in most cases, are based on the individual's monthly income.

A sampling of services avaliable include the Home Delivered Meal program that provides one hot, nutritionally balanced meal that can be delivered up to 6 days per week if the person is homebound and unable to prepare their own meal. Presently ENOA serves approximately 1,500 meals per day, helping the elderly remain independent.

Other programs available to meet a variety of needs may include Homemaker, Home Health Aide, Durable Medical Equipment, Handyman, Neighbor-to-Neighbor, Respite Care, Gatekeeper, Yard Cleaning and Snow Removal, and Emergency Pharmacy Assistance.

The ENOA information and referral phone line is available weekdays between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. at 444-6444. If an elderly person is unable to contact the office, a family member, friend, or concerned neighbor may do so on their behalf.



Neighbor of the Month... Martha Kelly

Martha Kelly, we know her as Mrs. Kelly, is our "Neighbor of the Month". Mrs. Kelly has lived in the Gifford Park area for over forty years and has been a longtime member of the GPNA. In about 1953 she first moved into the area to a location near North 30th Street which is now a parking lot for St. Joseph's Hospital. She later moved to her current address of 3315 Davenport Street. Mrs. Kelly noted when the West Expressway was planned to be built and pass near Davenport Street, many people moved away because they were afraid of losing their home. She said this had a big impact and forever changed the neighborhood. Mrs. Kelly decided to stay.

Mrs. Kelly was born in the small town of Dexter, Iowa in 1910. She graduated from Grinnell College in Iowa with a degrees in Biology and Chemistry. She was married in 1935 to Harley Kelly. Their four children, two boys and two girls, all attended Yates Elementary School and graduated from Central High School. Mrs. Kelly worked at University of Nebraska Medical Center as a Research Technician from 1955 until 1970. Her husband Harley worked as a mail carrier. He passed away in 1971. Mrs. Kelly enjoys gardening and reading, especially mystery novels and biographies.

Recently Mrs. Kelly suffered a fall on the ice and broke both wrists. She said the casts are scheduled to come off in early March - she is eager to begin planting that backyard vegetable garden. Her daughters, who both live in Omaha, have been a great help during her recovery.

Mrs. Kelly says she likes the Gifford Park neighborhood because she is close to her church, St. Joseph's Hospital and her two daughters. Also she says the Gifford Park neighborhood has many good, solid people. Mrs. Kelly attends nearly every GPNA meeting that she is able. She provides great insight when there is discussion involving issues affecting our neighborhood. Mrs. Kelly, we hope to see you at the next meeting and congratulations for being our "Neighbor of the Month".

Historically Speaking...Raymond John Caffrey

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"The notorious bank robber Frank Nash had escaped from
Leavenworth Penitentiary, and was vacationing in Hot Springs, AK.
There the FBI caught up with him, and arrested him in 1933. Oklahoma City agents Francis Joseph 'Joe' Lackey and Frank Smith, assisted by Otto Reed, chief of police at McAlester, OK, who identified Nash, drove him to Fort Smith, AK, where they engaged Pullman beds on a Missouri Pacific train, due at the Kansas City Union Station at 7:15 a.m., Saturday, June 17.

There they were joined by K.C. FBI agents Reed Vatterli and Raymond John Caffrey, and K.C. police detectives W.J. 'Red' Grooms and Frank Hermanson. They marched the manacled Nash out to Caffrey's car and put him in the driver's seat temporarily.

Caffrey stood on the left of his steering wheel, preliminary to driving the prisoner back to Leavenworth Penitentiary. Lackey, Reed, and Smith got in the back seat, on the left, middle, and right. Caffrey's car was to be followed by Grooms and Hermanson in their car. They and Vetterli were standing to the right of

Caffrey's car.

Then all hell busted loose. Someone had phoned Nash's buddy Vern Miller from Fort Smith. Miller resolved to spring Nash. K.C. crime boss Jack Lazia recommended notorious bank robbers "Pretty Boy" Floyd and Adam "Eddie" Richetti to Miller (though they didn't know Nash), to join the caper. They thought it would be easy, since the FBI agents were unarmed, a policy soon changed.

Floyd shouted, 'Up, up, get'm up!', but Grooms reached for his revolver. Floyd panicked, and yelled,'Let the bastards have it!' He and Miller had tommy guns, and Richetti had a .38. They sprayed bullets at Caffrey's car from the north, west, and south.

Nash screamed, 'My God, don't shoot me!', but he, Reed, Caffrey, Grooms, and Hermanson were all killed. Lackey got two bullets near his spine, Vetterli was winged, and Smith was unscathed.

Floyd darted a look inside the Caffrey car, and gasped 'They're all dead in here!' Then Miller's bungling crew drove toward his rented home in Kansas City, tires screeching.


This story is now referred to as 'The Union Station Massacre.' Miller was found dead on the outskirts of Detroit in 1933. Floyd was shot by FBI agents in Ohio in 1934. Richetti was brought to trial in June of 1935 for the murder of Frank Hermanson and was the first man to die in Missouri's gas chamber in 1938.

Ray Caffrey's body was shipped to Omaha where he lay in state in his parent's parlor. A platoon of police marched at the head of the procession to Holy Sepulchre Cemetery where Caffrey is buried. Mrs. Caffrey died in 1961. They had one son, Jimmy, who became a surgeon and is now a pathologist in Kansas City.

Caffrey was honored by the FBI in 1983, fifty years after the slaying. A brass FBI seal was placed on his gravestone."

Tom's Tips... Wood Furniture-Repairing Dents

Dents are depressed layers of wood caused by hard impacts. They can be raised back to original level by steam. Place several lavers of damp fabric or damp. brown wrapping paper over the dent. Touch the fabric or paper with a warm iron. The steam will cause the wood fibers to swell back into place. It may be necessary to repeat this process until the dented area is level with the surface around it. Allow the area to dry.

Since the steam opens the wood pores, sand the area thoroughly to "repack" the grain. If you don't, the area will absorb more stain and have an uneven color.

NOTE—Don't use this treatment on veneers. The steam can soften the glue under the veneer and cause it to come loose. Also, be careful when applying steam near joints because the glue there can soften, also.

When an impact has been great enough to cut through the wood fibers, steam and heat will not repair the damage. Fill the dent with a wood filler to make it level. Follow directions on the package.
