Historically Speaking... Norman Korney

Last month I wrote about an outspoken woman from the Gifford Park area. This month I write about an outspoken man.

Norman Korney was known in later years as "Omaha's happiest senior citizen." I tag him as "outspoken" because he expressed his views at meetings, civic luncheons and breakfasts, and in the Public Pulse columns of the **Omaha**World-Herald and about 20 other publications.

Norm was born in Rock Island, Illinois, in 1911 and moved with his family to Omaha where they lived at 349 N. 35th Ave. Later, until about 1954, he and his wife and daughter lived at 3557 Cass St. He attended Yates School and Tech High; however, he did not graduate. He quit school and took a job as a school janitor. He attended night school and became a stationary engineer. After several years as an

Free Rubbish Disposal for Residents of Omaha

WHAT IS ACCEPTED?

- * Waste from home improvement or repair projects
- * Auto parts (exceptions: see NOT accepted)
- * Furniture
- * Household appliances
- * Tree & Brush branches 8" maximum
- * Clean Yardwaste (6406 So. 60th only) No plastic bags
- * Boxes
- * Broken Toys (swing sets, bicycles, and tricycles)
- * Paper
- * Metals
- * Glass
- * Rags
- * Wood
- * Concrete
- * EMPTY cans, pails, and buckets
- * Yard care equipment & tools
- * Tires (a fee will be charged)

VERY IMPORTANT! PLEASE

NOTE: State and local law requires that all loads be covered with a tarp. Nebraska Department of Transportation has been known to sit at these facilities and write tickets to those who do not comply.

WHAT IS NOT ACCEPTED?

- * Garbage
- * Hazardous waste including: Automobile fluids (gas, oil, grease, antifreeze, etc.) Paint and thinners Fertilizers and herbicides Other chemicals Lead acid batteries
- * Major construction debris
- * Dead animals
- * Fecal material
- * Animal bedding
- * Bagged grass and leaves

This is **NOT** intended to be an allencompassing list. It is meant to indicate the types of items that are not accepted. If the material you have is not on the list, please call 444-3908, and ask for Bob or Lou.

Vehicles/Trailers Accepted (to allow limited amounts):

Automobiles Passenger vans Cargo vans up to 7 cubic yards Pickups (maximum 2 foot side boards) Trailers (up to 200 cubic feet)

Proof of Omaha Residency:

Vehicle registration may be required to show that the City of Omaha wheel tax has been paid. Handicapped individuals, full-time students, and active duty military are exempt.

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engineer he became interested in selling and went to work in a paint store. After eight months he went into the paint business for himself, keeping his store for 20 years. He then sold it and worked in commercial real estate. In 1983, at the age of 71, he passed the G.E.D. exam, and received his high school diploma at a Burke High School ceremony.

Korney is perhaps best known to newspaper readers for his hundreds of letters to the Public Pulse. He wrote on subjects such as flags, Congress, the City of Omaha, political campaigns, wills, the war on drugs, the courts, corporations, the Nebraska Legislature, organ donations, balloons, nuclear stations, and a host of other topics.

Norm Korney loved Omaha. As a member of the Chamber of Commerce in 1963 he organized a river excursion of 35 Omaha men. They cruised the Missouri River from Omaha to Nebraska City, Rulo, Falls City, and Kansas City, talking up Omaha. Norm was given the title of "Grand Inquisitor Laureate" because he always had questions for visiting experts and was honored as "Man of the Year" in 1993 by the Omaha Business Men's Association. He ran for City Council in 1965 and for the MUD Board in 1968, but was defeated both times.

In 1993, with a doctor's diagnosis of stomach cancer, he was given only a few months to live, but his positive nature would not allow him to retire to the sidelines. Instead, he spoke to groups of student nurses and others on the subject of dying. He continued his regimen of meetings and letter writing. He was supported all the while by his wife, Gertrude, to whom he was married for 62 years. Norman Korney died at age 84 in 1996. He was eulogized at his funeral at Beth El Synagogue as having a great thirst for learning. Of life itself, Korney was quoted as saying, "It's been fun and I have absolutely no regrets. I feel like I was given a reprieve. It's been a wonderful life." Indeed, a life concerned about others is wonderful.


