# Historically Speaking... J.A.C. Kennedy

Although the Gifford Park Neighborhood Association goes only to 37th Street, I submit information about a man who lived at 521 North 38th Street. (After all, the house is on the east side of 38th Street.) The man was James A. C. Kennedy. He was a prominent Omaha lawyer, a former Dean of Omaha's practicing attorneys, and a legend among Omahans. He reportedly arose at 5 o'clock every morning and performed calisthenics for 40 minutes including ballet style high kicks. He would leave his home at 6:15 to walk to Mutual of Omaha where he was a director, eat breakfast in the company cafeteria, and walk three miles (counting from his home) to his office on the fifteenth floor of the City National Bank Building. He was senior partner in the law firm of Kennedy, Holland, DeLacy and Svoboda.

### **Hot Weather Pet Tips**

This information can help you care for your pet when the mercury rises:



- √ Overheating (heat prostration) can kill an animal. Never leave an animal alone in a vehicle, since even with the windows open, a parked car, truck or van can quickly become a furnace. Parking in shade offers little protection, as the sun shifts during the day. When traveling, carry a gallon thermos filled with fresh, cold water.
- √ Don't force your animal to exercise after a meal in hot, humid weather. Always exercise him or her in the cool of the early morning or evening.
- √ In extremely hot weather, don't leave your dog standing on the street, and keep walks to a minimum. He is much closer to the hot asphalt and his body can heat up quickly. His paws can burn since they are not protected by shoes.
- √ Always provide plenty of shade for an animal staying outside the house. A properly constructed dog house serves best. Bring your dog or cat inside during the heat of the day and let her rest in a cool part of your house. Always provide plenty of cool, clean water for your animal.

- $\sqrt{\text{Keep a current license and identification tag on your dog or cat.}}$
- √ Avoid walking your dog in areas that you suspect have been sprayed with insecticides or other chemicals, as poisonings increase during the summer when gardens, lawns and trees are sprayed. These chemicals can sicken or kill an animal.
- $\sqrt{\ }$  Be alert for coolant leaking from your vehicle. Animals are attracted to the sweet taste of coolant and ingesting just a small amount can cause an animal's death. Consider using animal-friendly products that use propylene glycol rather than those containing ethylene glycol.
- $\sqrt{\ }$  A clean coat can help to prevent summer skin problems, so keep your dog or cat well groomed. If he has a heavy coat, shaving your dog's hair to a one-inch length will help prevent overheating. Don't shave a dog's hair down to the skin; this robs him of protection from the sun. A cat should be brushed frequently to keep his coat tangle-free.
- $\sqrt{\ }$  Take your pet to the veterinarian for a spring or early summer checkup, including a test for heartworm if your dog isn't on year-round preventative medication. Have the doctor recommend a safe, effective flea and tick control program.
- $\sqrt{}$  Never tie an animal outside on a correction collar. He can choke to death. If you must tether him, use a buckle collar with identification tags instead. (This applies in any season.)
- √ Never let your animal run loose. This is how an animal can contract a fatal disease, including rabies, or be injured, killed or stolen. Be sure there are no open, unscreened windows or doors through which your animal can fall or jump.

### Historically Speaking...J.A.C. Kennedy

Kennedy was born in Omaha in 1876, the son of Irish descendants. His parents bought land and built a home at 16th and Jackson. He guit school at age 15 to become a messenger boy at the First National Bank, worked by day and attended classes at the Omaha School of Law by night. He graduated from the University of Nebraska School of Law in 1900. He was a lieutenant in the Spanish-American War commanding Company G of the 2nd Nebraska Volunteers at Chickamauga Park, GA. He was elected to the Nebraska Legislature in 1903 and served one term. He was married to Caroline Purvis and they had two children. Mrs. Kennedy died in 1945. Kennedy gave regularly to charities, but insisted that he be given no recognition.

Kennedy played golf, squash, and handball; giving up these activities only when members of his peer group were no longer living. He gave up playing "not because younger men were unpleasant," he said, "but you just naturally find yourself falling back on other things, like reading."

On the occasion of his 90th birthday in 1965 while he was still working regularly in his office, he was asked by a World-Herald reporter what would be his advice to young Americans. He replied, "I'd tell each one that if he wants to get ahead he should outwork the other fellow, and that's not too hard these days." "Sometimes," he admitted, "young Americans are a bit too soft, expect too much."

"I grew up in a frame house with no running water, no sewage system, no artificial light and no central heating," he said. "But I can't remember an unhappy day."

Asked how long he would continue working, he said, "I'll work until they carry me out. I'd be lost doing nothing."

Kennedy continued his rigorous routine until 1971 when he suffered a heart attack. After recuperation he continued as a counsel to his law firm and to the Mutual of Omaha board of directors.

On the day of the 1975 tornado he was sitting in bed reading. As the sirens wailed, his housekeeper came to his room and said, "Mr. Kennedy, I think I should help you to the basement." He smiled and said, "I would find that very inconvenient," and continued reading. Kennedy probably showed no greater alarm in 1935 during the Omaha Street Car Strike when a blast outside his home tore a two foot hole in the sidewalk on the north side and shattered windows in the house next door east.

J. A. C. Kennedy (the initials stand for James Aloysius Charles) died in June of 1975 just five months away from his 100th birthday. The funeral was held at St. Cecilias Cathedral with burial at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.
