



## A Message From The President

I am sure that those of you who attended the May meeting agree with me that the Duchesne building was well worth touring, with its many points of architectural interest, the chapel being the most impressive, in my opinion. Certainly the museum presented many informative photos of the history of Duchesne. Equally impressive is the educational program provided by the staff. Our thanks to Sheila Haggas and Mary Duffy for extending their hospitality to our group. If we have sufficient interest, perhaps we can schedule another tour in the future for those who were unable to attend.

Looking ahead, we will have the election of officers at the June meeting. The Nominating Committee has identified candidates for the four elective positions. Nominations will also be taken from the floor during the meeting. Nominations will then be closed and a vote taken, if needed.

As we had previously discussed, neither the executive board meeting nor the general meeting will be held in July. We do anticipate providing a newsletter that month.

One of the Association's two-way radios was taken at the cleanup in May. We would like to have it back. We are not especially interested in who took it. If you know who might have it, kindly encourage them to return it. They can drop it off at California Tacos, or give it to one of the members to bring to the meeting. I don't imagine that the radio serves any purpose for the person who took it, since you need at least two to use them. Certainly the Association needs to have the radios for our various functions.

As you may have read in the paper, the Association has received a grant of \$510 from the Omaha Community Foundation to help pay for the dumpsters for the fall cleanup. As you may know, the dumpsters for the spring cleanup are paid for by the city, but the association has, in the past, paid for the fall cleanup dumpsters from our treasury. The grant helps ease the cost considerably.

We had also requested funds to buy a printer for use by the volunteers who organize and prepare the newsletter for publication. As you may have noticed, some of the pictures haven't printed too well. A better printer would allow for better pictures, which would improve the quality of the newsletter. Unfortunately we did not receive a grant for this. We are currently investigating the cost and utility of the printers available, and will discuss this and vote on whether to spend the money at a future meeting. I believe that we have one of the best newsletters of the neighborhood associations, and also believe that the newsletter is a vital link to those in the neighborhood who are not members or who are unable to attend meetings. Improving the quality of the newsletter would improve the effectiveness of the Association. Considering the state of the treasury, which received substantial boosts from the garage sale and the cleanup, I think we can afford to spend the money, especially since the printer would last many years.

Also at the June meeting, I would like to try something new. As you may have continued on page 3



# **Neighborhood Tool Lending Is Seven Years Old**

The Gifford Park Neighborhood Tool Lending Program has been in operation for seven years. Its goal is simple: provide people in our neighborhood the opportunity to rent tools for a nominal fee (mainly to cover maintenance costs). Everyone can benefit - you <u>DO NOT</u> have to be a GPNA member to take advantage of this program. Many people in our area have no space to store tools or do not have access to certain tools. The neighborhood itself benefits when people use the tools to take care of their home and property.

Ladders, rakes, shovels, saws and garden tools are just some of the tools available with the program. Lawnmowers have been the most popular to rent at \$5. Many thanks go to Bob Hutton and Mike Bacome for maintenance of our mowers at little or no cost. The GPNA is always looking for additional tools or mowers that anyone would like to donate for the tool lending. 

# Weeds...how tall is too tall?

City of Omaha code states that weeds (or any vegetation) cannot be over 18" tall. The following steps can be taken if this code is violated:

- A complaint can be filed by anyone
- A City Inspector will send the property owner a 10 day notice to cut the weeds
- If the owner does not re spond, the address is put on a mowing list
- Property will be mowed and the owner will be charged according to the size of job
