

Thomas and his wife Mary are both Creighton University professors and also take a big interest in history. Dr. Kuhlman, who lives near 38th & Burt, shared his architectural expertise by presenting a

The President's Column

This is the time of year when we need to begin planning for the spring and summer events in our neighborhood. Many of you have volunteered for annual events such as the Easter Egg Hunt and Spring Cleanup in April, Sun Dawgs in June and July, the Tennis Program in August. The GPNA is working on other programs such as Show Wagon, which is an annual youth talent show performed in parks - Gifford Park successfully hosted this event a few years ago and we are talking with the City about hosting it again. We would like to partner again with our good friends at St. Joseph's Hospital and put on another bike rodeo. Last year's event had a bike raffle, low-priced helmets, bike training, obstacle course and repair station. Also, we plan to work with the PKA Fraternity on the second annual baseball/softball clinic in the park. We would like to have the PONY Softball League and others play their games in the park. We have tentatively made plans to have a summer social event in the park, like the Gifford Park Day of a few years ago (past GPNA President John Lynch organized this event). Ideas about this event will be shared at the next meeting. I encourage everyone to volunteer in these and other events – I guarantee it will be worth your while ... or your money back! And please call me or any of the board members if you have other ideas for our neighborhood.

Speaking of planning, the neighborhood association is currently developing a park master plan with **Pat Slaven** of the City Parks Department. She is scheduled to be our guest speaker at the **February 3**rd general meeting. Pat will present diagrams of Gifford Park and we welcome your ideas and discussion. We have discussed tree-planting, greenspace, flowers, a walk path, lights, art sculpture and restrooms. Many of you probably remember the major improvements to the park in the early 1990's, due to the efforts of the neighborhood association. Keep in mind, Gifford Park is a city park that should be used and enjoyed by everyone. Our neighborhood has an opportunity to provide input to make the park even better.

In November, Subby Anzaldo mentioned that **Creighton University** has plans to close or significantly diminish Burt Street east of 30th Street to downtown. Cuming Street would probably be converted to two-way traffic. We all know the dangerous interstate entrance intersection on Burt Street – our neighborhood kids have to walk this route to Kellom. Creighton wants to make Burt Street greenspace for their campus and make it safer for students walking. The **Jefferson Square Neighborhood Association** (north and east of Creighton) says they are in favor of this plan. Also the proposed downtown sports arena and convention center would require changes to streets and properties near downtown (if the project starts). As many of you know Creighton University owns a number of properties in our neighborhood, particularly east of 33rd Street. They do a good job of maintaining the properties. What do they plan to do with them? What direction is Creighton looking to build? **Jim Willet, Associate V.P.** with **Creighton**, is scheduled to be our guest speaker in March, this will be a good chance to ask these questions.

A quick update on police activities. Lt. Rich Swircinski is now Command Lieutenant for our area. Several of us will meet with him soon to discuss current issues and problem-solving strategies well before the weather gets warm. We met with Sgt. Steve Osier and Sgt. Dave Sedlacek to provide information and

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ask for continued enforcement. The GPNA's goal is for Police and residents to develop a good relationship so we can solve existing problems and even prevent future problems. This of course requires commitment from residents and Police. The GPNA Board recently submitted a Community Impact Statement to a Douglas County Judge against an individual who has caused significant problems around 33rd & California. The individual is currently in jail. The purpose of the Impact Statement is to let Judges know our neighborhood is serious about making our streets safer. Judges are required to read Impact Statements in preparation for sentencing. The GPNA is working with the Douglas County Attorney's Office and Police to monitor criminal cases involving individuals accused of crimes in our neighborhood.

I was a disappointed that we had little interest in attending the upcoming Neighborhood Builders workshop. This FREE program is a community effort among Omaha's Weed & Seed Strategy, the University of Nebraska at Omaha, various neighborhood associations, businesses and private citizens. The goal is to help build stronger, healthier, neighborhoods by assisting in developing positive leadership. The workshop will be held at St. Joseph's Hospital every Saturday in February (5,12,19,26) 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. (those attending can skip lunch to save time). There is still time to register. I strongly encourage anyone interested to call me at 342-6006 for more information or call Amy Krueger at 595-1214 - we need to develop more people in our neighborhood who are interested in improving our area.

We again want to thank longtime City Councilman Subby Anzaldo for his excellent service to the Gifford Park neighborhood. We wish Subby the best of luck with his new position as liaison between the Mayor and City Council. The City Council will narrow 21 applicants (to fill Subby's vacancy) to five finalists to be interviewed for final selection in February. Hopefully the City Council will select someone with whom we can develop a good relationship.

A final thought for this month's article is my sincere appreciation for those who continue to volunteer their time to make our neighborhood a better place, particularly those who have made committments to serve as GPNA Officers and committee chairs - keep up the good work.

IRS representatives will provide free tax help for our neighborhood. Processing of basic tax returns will be available. Electronic filing will be available this year. Walk-in appointments are welcome, but priority will be given to those who call to schedule an appointment. Free tax help will be available on the following dates:

Guard Lights Can Add Security

A guard light provides dusk-to-dawn lighting, offering an extra measure of security for your home. It helps eliminate shadows from your garage, driveway or walkways, and it discourages prowlers. It also can extend the amount of time you can spend on recreational or maintenance activities after dark. Guard lights are easy to obtain – you buy nothing and pay only for the electrical service. Guard lights are furnished, installed, owned and maintained by OPPD. They are available in 175-watt and 200-watt (commercial). You can have a guard light installed for \$8.66 per month plus tax for a 175-watt mercuryvapor lamp and \$11.65 per month plus tax for a 200watt high-pressure sodium lamp. If an OPPD pole is not located in an area where a guard light would be beneficial to you, OPPD will set an additional pole and extend service within certain specifications for an additional \$.60 per month plus \$.40 per month for each additional electrical line installed. <u>Christmas In April Omaha</u> is accepting applications from low-income elderly and disabled homeowners who need home repairs but are unable to afford to hire the work done or do not have the physical ability to do the work themselves. This is a free program with the work done by volunteers and trade professionals. To qualify, homeowners must live east of 52nd Street, be 62 years of age or older or have a permanent disability, and meet income guidelines. All homes must be structurally sound, and there are limitations on the type of work that can be done. For more information, or to request an application, call 965-9170.
