GPNA Spring Cleanup Only Days Away

The Gifford Park Neighborhood Association's Spring Cleanup will take place Saturday, May 6th, from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the Gifford Park south parking lot. The cleanup is open to all GPNA members and those who donate time or money to the Association.

The following items will <u>not</u> be accepted at the dumpster site: concrete, tree brush, yard waste, hazardous materials, paint, oil, or herbicides. Tree brush can be taken to the city's chipper site at 11th and Locust from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. only on May 6. Tires will be accepted at the cleanup - the earlier the better, since one run to the disposal site is being planned. A \$1.00 per tire handling fee will be charged. For information on the disposal of items not allowed in the cleanup, see page 3 of the April 2000 edition of the GPNA newsletter.

For large loads and disposal of couches or stuffed chairs, a donation to the Association would be appreciated. As in past years, \$10.00 will be charged for each air conditioner or refrigerator brought to the cleanup.

If help is needed, volunteers will haul your trash for a small donation to the Association. If you need the hauling service, it is very important that you call one of the following numbers as soon as possible: Chris 342-6006, Mike 341-8224, or Jim 551-1344.

Plenty of volunteers are needed to help with the cleanup. If you can spare a few hours, please call the numbers listed above. The cleanup is a great way to meet your neighbors, enjoy being out on a beautiful spring day (hopefully!), and make a positive impact on the neighborhood at the same time. 

Dugdale Jr., Bob Kelly, Scott Knudsen, Chip Maxwell, and Michael J. Siderewicz. The seven cadidates are competing in the May 9th primary with the two candidates receiving the most votes advancing to the November 7 general election. The forum should conclude at about 8:30 p.m. Please plan on attending what should be a very interesting and informative meeting.

Neighborhood Maintenance Program Organized

The GPNA is starting a project to hopefully bring problem solving down to a block by block level. The project is called Neighborhood Maintenance and the goal is for each block to have a captain to document problems in his/her area. Each block captain will be provided with a list of all property addresses along with the owner's name. Each property address will have a form to document problems such as criminal behavior, ordinance and code violations, weeds and litter, etc. The block captain will record information such as the date, issue, agency contacted and action taken. This information can be very useful if we need to contact the owner (police and other agencies) to get a handle on chronic problem properties, especially with absentee landlords, of which there are many in our neighborhood.

Many thanks to Betsy Noble and Jackie Lynch for a lot of hard work to get this project going. They presented a final draft at the April GPNA meeting. Since then, about 35 block books have been printed. The next step is to identify block captains; this is where we need your help. Betsy and Jackie have made the forms simple to fill out and maintain. Walking Neighborhood Watch Underway

We need people, male or female, young or old, who care about the Gifford Park Neighborhood and want to learn what happens in our neighborhood at different times of the day and night. We need to let our presence as a group be felt. This may just make us all more aware of the activities taking place in our area. The purpose is to walk and observe our neighborhood streets in a non-confrontational manner.

Last October we averaged about 20 people on three separate walks on 33rd Street, and we have had two walks so far this spring. We felt it was very effective in showing support for our business district and residents who live along 33rd Street. With the weather warming up, this is a great time to organize our Walking Neighborhood Watch. Remember, if you have any doubts about your safety, there is safety in numbers.

Need Your House Painted? At No Cost!

You could have the exterior of your home painted at absolutely no cost by volunteers from Omaha area businesses, congregations, and service clubs. The 12th annual **Brush Up Nebraska Paint-A-Thon** is looking for low-income elderly and disabled homeowners whose houses need a new coat of paint. Homeowners who may be eligible can apply for this service by filling out an application form, which is available at any **Norwest Bank** or by calling **First Call for Help**, **444-6666**. An independent selection committee of housing and human service agency professionals will review the applications. The application deadline is **June 5**. Those homes that are selected will be painted by a team of volunteers on **August 19**.

The Paint-A-Thon was established in 1989 as a community service to older adults and disabled homeowners who are unable to physically or financially paint their homes. Since the program began, volunteers have painted 1,279 houses, with a goal of 100 homes this year. The Paint-A-Thon is made possible through the financial support of a large number of area businesses.




