

The Gifford Park neighborhood was a bevy of activity during the month of May. Saturday, May 6th, was the annual spring cleanup in the park's parking lot. A total of 9 dumpsters were filled, 40 tires were collected, and at least 5 loads of scrap metal were hauled during the course of the afternoon. Over \$550 was collected in donations and membership dues.

#### **GPNA Receives Tree Planting Funds**

A good portion of the park master plan for Gifford Park may soon become reality. The GPNA received great news from representatives of the Community Enhancement Program (a cooperative program of the Nebraska Department of Roads, the Nebraska Forest Service and the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum) regarding our park plan. They have committed \$14,000 for tree and shrub planting in Gifford Park. The Omaha World Herald Branching Out Program will commit an additional \$3,500 for tree planting. This amount of funding will allow us to implement the most important component of the park master plan. Pat Slaven, City Park Planner, has worked very hard to develop the plan which included on-going input from the GPNA. Special thanks to Rob Parolek who initiated discussion of the park master plan last year. The work by all those involved will mean significant park improvements to be enjoyed by our community for years to come. We are currently getting bids for the project planting specifications. We are most likely looking at a fall planting. We have discussed having a "Gifford Park Day" to dedicate the tree planting this fall - we'll keep you posted.

#### The President's Column

As most of you know the last couple of months have been very busy in the GPNA. The Easter Egg Hunt, Spring Cleanup, Tennis Blitz, Bike Rodeo, Ice Cream Social and Candidates Forum at the May meeting, Watch Group and Neighborhood Walks, and the development of the Gifford Park master plan have all taken place recently. I want to thank everyone who participated and assisted with these and other activities. Your efforts are appreciated more than you know. I think most will agree it's good to finally get a short break from neighborhood activities so we can work on our own projects or take vacations. After all, this is a volunteer organization which we sometimes forget to realize with the hard work so many people put in, but I believe it's worth it.

With GPNA officer elections upon us I'd like to spend just a moment thanking our current officers who served the past year and in some cases two years. First, Sandy Saner served as Treasurer for the last two years as we saw our treasury funds continue to grow. Sandy has been very active with many of our activities. Jean Peck served as Recording Secretary for the past two years. This position requires attending every meeting, and I don't remember Jean ever missing a meeting – that's 12 general and 12 board meetings each year. And Brad Bogard who served as Vice President for the past year. Besides having a family and running the very successful California Tacos, Brad keeps watch in the business district, assisted me with setting up meetings and sharing ideas. His energy and enthusiasm help create excitement for our neighborhood. Thanks to all of the officers for unselfishly giving their time.

I also wish to thank Jim Wilwerding for his continued support as past president. Jim not only participates in just about every event, but he has helped me a great deal through my first year as president.

I want to get everyone up to date with other activities of the GPNA. We organized a meeting May 10 th with landlords and business owners to discuss problems and solutions around 33<sup>rd</sup> Street. There was a good turnout with the following solutions discussed: better lighting in the business district; better police enforcement; get more property owners involved; crackdown on permit and code violations; organize more neighborhood walks on 33<sup>rd</sup> Street; and hiring an offduty police officer.

At our last GPNA board meeting we discussed at length the parameters for hiring an off-duty police officer for a few hours a week to provide additional police presence to the 33<sup>rd</sup> Street area. Details are still being developed, but generally speaking the business and property owners would pay for this service, particularly during higher crime months. The GPNA would commit some funds to this effort. One of the biggest problems we face is from the behavior and crime committed by individuals who don't even live in the neighborhood, but they apparently feel they can get away with it on 33<sup>rd</sup> Street.

We must also continue to organize and recruit more people for our neighborhood walks. This is especially true now with summer break for kids. The purpose is to let our presence as a group be felt by walking and observing our neighborhood streets in a non-confrontational manner. Thus far the walks have been very successful this spring. Please consider joining us on neighborhood walks; you will not regret the experience of meeting your neighbors and making a difference. # Weeds...how tall is too tall?

City of Omaha code states that weeds (or any vegetation) cannot be over 18" tall. The following steps can be taken if this code is violated:

- A complaint can be filed by anyone
- A City Inspector will send the property owner a 10 day notice to cut the weeds
- If the owner does not respond, the address is put on a mowing list
- Property will be mowed and the owner will be charged according to the size of job
