Gifford Park was host to Show Wagon 2001, a youth talent competition, and The Gravydippers Band on Tuesday evening June 19. Rain in the morning threatened to cause a cancellation of the stage events as it had on Gifford Park Day, but this time the evening turned out to be very nice, allowing the audience to sit on blankets, lawn chairs and even the grass on the northeast part of the park. Loren Johnson of J-N-J Grocery donated hot dogs, pop and arranged to have a hot dog wagon in the park.

About 15 Show Wagon acts came from all over, including local acts from the Gifford Park neighborhood. Acts included dancing, singing, rap, tap dancing, and others. The judges had difficult decisions picking the winners. Three of the judges, **Brian Kokensparger**, **Mary Theresa Green** and **Kristin Pluhacek**, live in our neighborhood. 


Compactors Aid Spring Cleanup Effort


How about those trash compactors at this year's spring cleanup! They were awesome. About three compactors were filled at this year's cleanup, held Saturday, June 16 in Gifford Park. This is comparable to about ten or twelve 20 CY dumpsters that have been filled in recent years. The City Public Works Department ran the cleanup and it appeared to be a very efficient operation. Some of the other highlights: collecting 8 tons of scrap metal (most ever) and nearly 60 tires, signing up 35 memberships, and collecting nearly \$500 in membership fees and donations. Loren Johnson of J-N-J Grocerv donated hot dogs and California Bar donated pop for the workers. 

Officer John Schmitt with the Police Nuisance Unit gave a very interesting presentation at our June Meeting at St. Joseph's Hospital. He showed many slides depicting vehicle violations that can be reported to police and the Mayor's Action Line (444-5555). The key is to understand the laws and ordinances and to use them appropriately when other solutions fail take care of the problem. The GPNA encourages everyone to accurately document problems and report them in a timely manner – it does make a difference!

Good luck to **Loren Johnson** on opening up a new **J-N-J Grocery** near 40th & Bedford. The store was completely remodeled over the past couple months. Loren says the neighborhood has been very positive. Stop by the new store if you get a chance.

As mentioned last month, all the trees and shrubs have been planted in the park. The GPNA met with **Pat Slaven**, City Park Planner, and **Kate Schumaker**, Nebraska State Arboretum, to review the planting project in Gifford Park. There are a few replacements and punchlist items for Indian Creek to complete, but all in all the plantings seem to be doing well. We need volunteers to help with weeding and trash pickup in the park on a periodic basis – call **342-6006** if you can help.

The proposed Assisted Living Center, which would be on the Duchesne Campus, was to go before the Landmark's Heritage Preservation Commission Board for a vote on June 13, but was postponed until July because several board members were unable to attend. The board will rule on whether physical changes to the building will impact the historic integrity of the neighborhood. The proposal is then expected to go before the City Council.

A group of GPNA volunteers are starting a "community garden" on a vacant lot at 3416 Cass St. A handful of volunteers spent some time clearing trash, weeds, trees and branches from the lot. Plans are to map out where and what to plant yet this summer and till up those sections soon to get plants started. The goal is to create a similar community garden like the City Sprouts location at 40th & Franklin. Anyone interested in participating can call Annemarie 342-1340 or Chris 342-6006.

The slate of individuals volunteering to be officers in the GPNA for 2001-2002 was presented before the June general meeting by **Terry Wilwerding**, chair of the Nominating Committee. Gifford Park Day Revisited

After the rainout on May 5, the event was held Saturday, May 12 in Gifford Park. Volunteers decorated bikes beginning at 11 a.m. At noon there were memorial tree dedications for Laura Watson Dalton and Ed Hendershot. Joel Long with Omaha World Herald Branching Out, Subby Anzaldo and former mayor Hal Daub spoke. The mayor then started the parade through the park with the Condor Marching Band leading the way. 



Weeds...how tall is too tall?

City of Omaha code states that weeds (or any vegetation) cannot be over 18" tall. The following steps can be taken if this code is violated:

- A complaint can be filed by anyone
- A City Inspector will send the property owner a 10 day notice to cut the weeds
- If the owner does not respond, the address is put on a mowing list
- Property will be mowed and the owner will be charged according to the size of job
