The Seventh Annual Recognition Banquet of the Omaha Coalition of Citizen Patrols and Neighborhood Watch Captains was held on March 14 at the Westside Community Education Center. The purpose of the banquet, sponsored by AAA Nebraska and the OPD Community Resource Center, is to honor citizen patrollers from each of the neighborhood associations that belong to the OCCP. Members of the various neighborhood associations not only nominate a citizen patroller from their watch group to receive the award each year, but they also choose an Omaha police officer that has gone "above and beyond" the call of duty to be of assistance in helping with neighborhood problems.

This year GPNA President Peter Cihunka, who is an active participant in the GPNA Watch Group, was chosen to receive the award. Officer Paul Milone from the Northeast Precinct was the GPNA's choice to receive the Officer of the Year Award. Both nominees received plaques from Police Chief Don Carey. The GPNA was well represented at the banquet; on hand to congratulate the award winners were Vicki and Ron Frey, Harry Dirgo, Mike and Nadja Wilwerding, Terry and Sue Wilwerding, and Officer Milone's wife Catherine and daughter Isabelle.



April 20 Is Date For Annual Spring Cleanup

This year's GPNA Spring Cleanup will be held in the Gifford Park South Parking Lot on Saturday, April 20, from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The cleanup is open to all GPNA members and those who donate time or money to the Association.

The following items will <u>not</u> be accepted: concrete, yard waste, hazardous materials, paint, oil, or herbicides. Vouchers will be available for tree brush disposal through River City Recycling; these will be given on a first come, first serve basis, with large loads taking precedence over small ones. Holy Name Church/School is the area's tire disposal location (2901 Fontenelle Blvd.) For large loads and disposal of couches or stuffed chairs, a donation to the Association would be appreciated. As in past years, \$10.00 will be charged for each air conditioner or refrigerator brought to the cleanup.

If assistance is needed, volunteers will haul your trash for a small donation to the GPNA. If you need this service, it is very important that you call Chris 342-6006, Peter 341-7293, or Jim 551-1344 as soon as possible before the cleanup. Plenty of volunteers are needed to help with the cleanup. If you can spare a few hours, please call the numbers listed above. You'll also be able to join or renew your GPNA membership at the cleanup. Main Street Program Topic Of Meeting

On March 20 the GPNA hosted a meeting at St. Joseph's Hospital to discuss neighborhood improvement with the focus on revitalization of our business district using the Main Street Program model. We had a very good turnout including most of the "stakeholders" impacting the future of our neighborhood. Representatives included property and business owners from the 33rd & California business district, major surrounding businesses and institutions, city government, GPNA board members, and other surrounding neighborhood association presidents.

The purpose of the meeting was to get the stakeholders together to ask for a commitment to continue with future participation in working together to improve our neighborhood. Information was presented on the Main Street Program and how it has worked in other cities to revitalize local business districts and strengthen neighborhoods. Economic statistics from the census data were also presented to show the potential that our area has for future business development. The group also discussed some initial ideas about parking and other improvements in the 33rd & California area. We plan to have another meeting within the next month to discuss more specific projects and direction. The GPNA thanks everyone who attended this first meeting.

Free Tax Help Is Here Again







What's Happening In The Neighborhood . . .

There is good news and bad news regarding trees in Gifford Park. The good news is that many large trees (mostly cottonwoods) marked with orange dots in the west end of the park are marked for pruning, NOT cut down as reported in last month's newsletter. The bad news is someone drove their car through part of the southwest part of the park knocking down three of the newly planted trees from last year's grant. The driver nearly drove his car into the building shelter. The GPNA is pursuing compensation for damages since the police did make an arrest.

Gifford Park will again be a host site for both the Sun Dawgs Summer Youth Program and the Show Wagon Youth Talent Competition. We again thank the City of Omaha and in particular the Parks & Recreation Department for their great work and commitment to supporting these important activities in Gifford Park. The GPNA extends our thanks to former City employee Cis Carlson for her work with bringing Show Wagon back to Gifford Park two years ago. Cis retired last year. Karin Madden, who works at Florence Community Center, is handling Show Wagon this year.

You probably know that **Creighton University** has been purchasing property on the block bounded by 30th to 32nd and California to Webster. Creighton is working on master plans for future development and has committed to include the GPNA in this process.

Congratulations to GPNA President Peter Cihunka for being selected to attend the NUSA Neighborhood's USA conference in Houston in May. Holy Name Housing is sponsoring the grants.

Community Garden Update – Information was presented at the March GPNA meeting describing the Community Garden project mission, goals and purpose. The garden property is located at **3416 Cass Street**. With spring upon us, the bulbs planted last fall are coming up along the front wall and should begin blooming soon. We plan to break ground in the next few weeks and begin planting early season vegetables and flowers.
