
Plenty Of Good Reasons To Attend May GPNA Meeting

Spring is here and it looks like it will be a good one. My grass is actually green! I would like to thank the person who planted the seed in my yard last year without me knowing... it sure did make a difference.

There is a lot going on in the neighborhood association this time of year. We are currently looking for new leadership within our organization. We are always looking for "fresh blood", new ideas. An organization will go stagnant and eventually fail with out the influx of new ideas. Does anyone remember the USSR? This time of year also brings about an increase in **ALL** kinds of activity in our neighborhood. I know that most of us are tired of being cooped up from the winter and are ready to let loose a little bit: get outside and work on the yard, the house, clean up the weeds, etc. Well, it works that way for our "undesirable" elements too (I bet you thought you did NOT have anything in common with them, didn't you?). If you have been down to 33rd Street lately, you know what I am talking about. I am not saying that everyone who "hangs out" there is an "undesirable" element; however, I am a realist and I know most of you are too. In the last few weeks, there have been major drug busts in our neighborhood. At one such bust, the police seized 10 illegal weapons and professional surveillance equipment. Let's take a minute to recognize two things: first, **thank you** Northeast Precinct for getting that "stuff" out of our neighborhood. Second, the Police CANNOT do it all by themselves.

We have DRUGS in our hood. We have illegal DOG FIGHTS going on in our hood. WE need to take care of our own. The sad part is that most of the "undesirables" do NOT live within our neighborhood. They come from somewhere else and mess up our living space! How does that make you feel? What if I came over to your house, took off my shoes, propped my feet up on your nice coffee table, smoked in your clean house, drank all your beverages, ate all your food, insulted your spouse, used profanity in front of your kids, kicked your dog, tossed your cat, and used your toilet WITHOUT putting the lid down when I was done. Now, how does that make you feel?


Last year, I stood up at a general meeting and asked everyone to go out of their way and make an extra trip by 33rd & California St. or some other "active" area every day. It only takes a few minutes. If you see something illegal, call it in! Wait until you blocks away if you wish, NO ONE will know who you are. Do you think I always want people to know I was the one who called? NO way! I have the same concerns as all of you do; member and non-member alike, owner and renter, parent or non-parent. Please make that extra trip, it WILL make a difference.... I promise!

Do not underestimate the power of talking to your neighbors. Go outside! Sit on your porch. I know I am less apt to do something I should not do if I know I am being watched. Leave your porch light on overnight. These small things can make a huge difference. Start by looking out for the neighbor to your left. Next week, add the neighbor to the right. If anyone is interested in being some of that fresh blood I mentioned earlier, I definitely welcome your input...on this topic especially.



Memorial Day At Prospect Hill Cemetery

Memorial Day is a day to remember fallen heroes and departed love ones. Many of us will visit cemeteries in and around the area. After that is done, plan to attend the Memorial Day ceremony at **Prospect Hill Cemetery.** This cemetery at 33rd and Parker is almost within walking distance of the Gifford Park neighborhood. It is the oldest cemetery in Omaha and is the resting place of many early Omaha residents including **Byron Reed, James Woolworth, Andrew Hanscom, Phineas T. Hitchcock, Andrew Poppleton, Ezra and Joseph Millard, John Redick, and Henry W. Yates.**

This year's celebration at Prospect Hill will take place at 11:00 a.m. on May 27. The Prospect Hill Preservation Brass Ensemble will give a concert beginning at 10:45 a.m., followed by the flag raising by the Civil War Reenactment Color Guard, which will also give a 21-gun Victorian-type musket salute. The speaker for the event will be Joan Hennecke, well-known Omaha actress who recently starred in "The Foreigner" at the Dundee Dinner Theater. She will tell the story of the Reverend Reuben Gaylord, who was the first Congregational minister in Omaha. At the conclusion of the program the band will lead the way to one of the more ornate monuments — that of Dan Allen, a riverboat gambler. His life consort, Anna Wilson, whose "house was not a home" is also buried there. The band plays "When the Saints Go Marching In", and someone places a yellow rose on the large tombstone of Anna Wilson.

Another interesting monument is that of the Four Boys. Four broken columns of varying lengths mark the common gravesite of four boys, ranging in age from 10 to 14 years. Out rabbit hunting in 1884, the lads died when they discovered and somehow blew up an abandoned powder magazine. The broken pillars signify their broken lives.

Take the time, bring your lawn chairs, and attend this unique Memorial Day service and look for some of these interesting gravesites. A walking guide is available so you can find the sites. Parking is available inside the cemetery from the entrance on Parker Street.

Summer Camps To Be Held At Creighton

The National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) will be held at Creighton University June 5 – July 12, from 7:30 a.m. to 1:45 p.m., Monday - Friday. Since 1968, the NYSP has combined sports instruction with exciting educational programs for youth ages 10-16. Enrollment is open to all youngsters in the community whose parent(s) or guardian(s) meet(s) Department of Health and Human Services income guidelines, at no cost. Activities include swimming, basketball, football (touch or flag), softball. track and field, soccer, volleyball, baseball, bowling, and golf. Top-quality sports equipment is provided by the program. Field trips to locations such as the Henry Doorly Zoo are also part of the program. Community leaders bring information to participants on subjects such as alcohol and other drug-abuse prevention, nutrition and personal health, career opportunities and job responsibilities, higher education and community concerns, and math/science instruction. NSYP participants also receive an NSYP T-shirt, a daily USDA-approved meal, transportation to campus (if necessary), a medical examination, accident/medical insurance coverage, and interaction with college students and staff. Creighton will also be holding the Junior Wheelchair Sports & Recreation Camp August 5 - 9, 10 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. at the Kiewit Fitness Center on campus. This no-cost camp is geared for youth, ages 6-18, of normal intelligence with physical disabilities that would require a chair for athletic participation. In addition to sports, campers are exposed to a variety of leisure activities and field trips. Lunch, drinks, snacks, transportation and sports chairs (if needed) are provided. 

GPNA 2002 Spring Cleanup

The annual GPNA Spring Cleanup was held on Saturday, April 20th in Gifford Park. Although it was a bit chilly, the rain held off until after the cleanup was over. There was a steady line of cars to the parking lot all day, with loads of trash that filled nearly 4 compactors. Approximately 50 tires were taken from the neighborhood to the disposal location at Holy Name School. Over \$550 in memberships, donations, and scrap items and over 5 tons of scrap metal was recycled.

Special thanks to **Peter Cihunka** for heading up this year's cleanup. Things went smoothly and everyone seemed to have a good time. Pete worked his magic in holding off the rain until just after the cleanup was done! The only hold up was the time waiting for additional compactors - but what do you expect when you have the best neighborhood cleanup crew in the city?

What's Happening In The Neighborhood . . .

Unfortunately, the GPNA will NOT receive any compensation for damages resulting from the incident in March when someone drove a stolen car through part of the southwest part of the park, destroying three of the newly planted trees. GPNA member Jan Franks pursued the matter with the Police and City Prosecutor Marty Conboy, but in the end there is not much anyone can do since the vehicle was stolen.

The GPNA welcomes Stacy Henry, the new Community Resource Specialist for the Northeast Precinct. She is the direct liaison to our neighborhood. She can be reached at 444-3367. There is a meeting Wednesday, May 15 at 6 p.m. at the Northeast Precinct, 30th & Taylor. The purpose of the meeting is to establish a relationship between neighborhood association leaders and the Police. Stacy along with Captain Thomas Warren will be on hand to discuss issues.

Many thanks to IRS volunteers Jackie Foster and Pat Prochaska who provided free tax help in our neighborhood again this year. Yates Elementary School was the site. They processed a total of 66 returns this year, most electronically filed.

Doesn't the park look nice this spring with all the new trees from our planting project completed last year? It's worth mentioning again that this project involved many people, but special recognition goes to **Kate Schumaker** and **Dave Mooter** with the Nebraska State Arboretum, which provided a \$14,000 grant; **Joel Long** with the Omaha World Branching Out Program, which provided a \$3,500 grant; **Pat Slaven**, Park Planner with the City of Omaha, who met a number of times with the GPNA to create the park master plan; and finally **Scott Farrington** with Indian Creek Nursery, who was a pleasure to work with every step of the way. It is because of their efforts and vision that Gifford Park will continue to be the focal point for activity in our neighborhood for many years to come.

The GPNA thanks the **Omaha Community Foundation** for approving our grant proposal for \$700 toward our Fall Cleanup event. The money will help pay for trash compactors/dumpsters, food, pumpkins and other supplies.

City Sprouts and farmer/grower Rebecca Bloom is hosting a Spring Plant Sale on Saturday, May 11 and May 18, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Urban League of Nebraska Family Resource Center at 3040 Lake St. Vegetable starts, flower starts, and flower baskets will be available. Make plans to join Friends of Joslyn Castle at the annual Spring Gala on Friday, May 17. A truly elegant event, the Gala features dinner and a slient auction. The evening begins at 6:30 p.m. with cocktails. During cocktails, a silent auction will feature spectacular "must-have" summer, picnic, and gardening items. Dinner will be served at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are \$85 per person (\$55 tax deductible). The funds raised from the Spring Gala will be used to support the preservation, restoration, and ongoing community use of the Castle. Completed in 1903, the Castle took eleven months to build and cost \$250,000. The home of George and Sarah Joslyn is one of Nebraska's most remarkable residences. The Castle is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is a designated local landmark. Call 595-2199 to make your reservations early. Space is limited.

The Douglas County Historical Society will open an exhibit May 1 at Heartland of America Park, 8th and Douglas St., that features four themes on the history of Omaha and Douglas County. The exhibit, which is free and open to the public during visiting hours at the park, will be housed in a 60-linear foot case located under the shelter along the north shore of the Heartland Park lake. The themes include Thomas Cuming and the Territorial Capitol, Tall Buildings of Omaha, Omaha's Park and Boulevard System, and Omaha in 1902. The exhibit will continue through April 2003.

Need Your House Painted? Paint-A-Thon May Be Able To Help

You could have the exterior of your home painted at absolutely no cost by volunteers from Omaha area businesses, congregations, and service clubs. The 14th Annual Brush Up Nebraska Paint-A-Thon is looking for lowincome elderly and disabled homeowners whose houses need a new coat of paint. Homeowners who may be eligible can apply for this service by filling out an application form, which is available at any Wells Fargo Bank or by calling First Call For Help, 444-6666. An independent selection committee of housing and human service agency professionals will review the applications. The application deadline is June 7. Those homes that are selected will be painted by a team of volunteers on August 17.

The Paint-A-Thon was established in 1989 as a community service to older adults and disabled homeowners who are unable to physically or financially paint their homes. Since the program began, volunteers have painted over 1300 houses. The Paint-A-Thon is made possible through the financial support of a large number of area businesses.
