The President's Column

Well, it has been a whole year that I have been the president of this fine organization; it has flown by. So many things have happened, so many goals met, so many accomplishments. Yet, I feel like there is so much more to be done.

When I took this office last year, I set out to accomplish three things. The first goal was to increase membership/participation in the neighborhood association. Originally, I thought the best way to do this was to reach out to the different groups who live with in our boundaries...get them more involved. This has been a slow process and it is still in the works. But one thing that has happened is that we have brought new people into the core group. Every organization has a core. For years, the GPNA has prospered and been successful because of the hard work of a small core group of dedicated people. As the year went on, my goal was to expand that core... and I am glad to say we have. So, mixed results here.

The second goal was to maintain public safety around 33rd and California and throughout the neighborhood. We continue to work with city officials, the Omaha Police, landlords, and property owners to better our way of life. There have been some challenges that have surfaced over the last year, but overall, we have been very successful. I have received buy-in from several people who live in our neighborhood who agree with my philosophy that ultimately we are primarily responsible for our own public safety. We all need to accept this fact and watch out for each other. Overall, I would say we have been successful here.

The third goal was to double the membership of the GPNA. I have fallen far short in this area. On average, we have approximately 160 paid households in our organization. We literally have over a thousand households within our boundaries. So, approximately 10% of the households in our neighborhood are members of our organization. This needs to improve. We should be able to double this number by this time next year.

So, I look forward to another year of serving you as your president. I consider it to be my honor to hold this office and to serve with those folks listed to the left: The Board. They make up that "core group" I was talking about earlier. They are very dedicated and have a great deal of concern for our neighborhood and the people who live here. I would also like to welcome the new board members: Eve Randone, Heather Nelson, Cynthia Shuck, and Ron Frey (see page 3). I look forward to working with all of you for the next year.


The election will be held at the general meeting on June 6th. Only current GPNA members will be allowed to vote.

To date twelve garden plots have been spoken for. There are two plot sizes available to rent: a 5' x 8' section is \$8/year, and a 5' x 15' section is \$15/year. We require each plot owner to follow basic common sense guidelines and organic gardening practices. We are building a tool shed in the next couple weeks to store garden tools and supplies. Besides the individual plots, we are planting some different "theme" gardens (herb, butterfly, children's, etc.) to make it interesting - everyone is welcome to walk onto the community garden site to see what is going on. Youth Sports Program To Be Held At Creighton

Its not too late to register your child for the National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) wheh will be held at Creighton University June 5 – July 12, from 7:30 a.m. to 1:45 p.m., Monday - Friday. Since 1968, the NYSP has combined sports instruction with exciting educational programs for youth ages 10-16. Enrollment is open to all youngsters in the community whose parent(s) or guardian(s) meet(s) Department of Health and Human Services income guidelines, at no cost. Activities include swimming, basketball, football (touch or flag), softball, track and field, soccer, volleyball, baseball, bowling, and golf. Top-quality sports equipment is provided by the program. Field trips to locations such as the Henry Doorly Zoo are also part of the program. Community leaders bring information to participants on subjects such as alcohol and other drug-abuse prevention, nutrition and personal health, career opportunities and job responsibilities, higher education and community concerns, and math/science instruction. NSYP participants also receive an NSYP T-shirt, a daily USDA-approved meal, transportation to campus (if necessary), a medical examination, accident/medical insurance coverage, and interaction with college students and staff.
