Silent Night? I Don't Think So



Creighton University's Master Plan Update

During GPNA's special meeting November 14, Creighton University discussed with area residents and community advocate groups the current campus expansion efforts planned for the next 20 years. The presentation focused mostly on the westward-expanding medical campus from 30th to 32nd Street and Webster to California Street. On the 1-5 year horizon is a new ambulatory care center (a twin to the current Cardiac Center on 30th and Webster), which will provide outpatient services for Creighton University Medical Center. Another immediate goal will be a surface parking lot covering the majority of the remaining blocks, which will alleviate the street-parking crisis at the east end of our neighborhood. Dan Burkey, Vice President for Administration and Finance at Creighton, assured residents the new parking lot would be separated by a "green space" and landscaped in the spirit of the adjacent Cardiac Center's parking lot. The University currently owns the majority of properties within this designated series of blocks. One major concern noted by an area resident was about Creighton insuring the safety and security of the remaining abandoned houses until the new parking lot is in place. The vacant buildings have apparently


GPNA Holds 4th Annual Holiday Lighting Contest

attracted the unwanted attention of squatters and illicit drug dealing (if any anyone observes this kind of activity, please call 911).

Another safety issue that was brought up concerned the dangerous pedestrian traffic crossing over 30th Street at non-traffic light intersections. This issue was brought up several years ago when Creighton's former administration was headed by Fr. Morrison and still remains unaddressed.

On the boards for the 10-20 year master planning range are a semi-enclosed parking structure, and two-and-three story apartment-style campus housing complexes. The architectural style for the proposed new buildings will be an eclectic combination of old and new campus architecture with an emphasis on playful, pedestrian-scaled buildings. Lets all hope for architecture with a capital A. Creighton has promised to keep the neighborhood involved in the development process as it continues to grow into our neighborhood.

Mercury "Roundup" Held In Omaha

The Nebraska Health and Human Services System is sponsoring a "mercury roundup" in the Omaha area, which will run through March 15, 2003. The purpose of the roundup is to get mercury out of people's homes because it is dangerous, and to prevent it from entering the environment through improper disposal. People can turn in their household mercury-containing thermometers for recycling at the Douglas-Sarpy County Extension Office. Thermostats, switches, button batteries, fluorescent light tubes, liquid mercury, or any other mercury-containing devices will **NOT** be accepted. The extension office is at 8015 Center Street and is open from 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m.

What's Happening In The Neighborhood . . .

On Monday, December 2nd, at 7:00 p.m., the Joslyn Castle Neighborhood Association will host its second annual Tree Lighting Ceremony at Joslyn Castle, located at 39th and Davenport St. A large Christmas tree will be set up outside the front entrance to the Castle and at 7:05 p.m. the tree lights will be turned on as visitors sing Christmas carols. Neighborhood churches and schools including St. Barnabas Church, Duchesne Academy, choirs from the St. Cecilia's Schola Cantorum and Calvary Baptist Church will all perform inside the Castle throughout the evening. There will be craft tables where children can make Victorian decorations and Santa Claus will be strolling through the Castle handing out candy. Donations for needy students and their families from Yates School will be accepted at the door. Items most needed include toilet paper, laundry soap, toothpaste and toothbrushes, bar soap, deodorant, grocery store gift cards, and board & card games.

Longtime GPNA member and 1999's "Neighbor Of The Year" Harry Dirgo is doing very well after recent surgeries in early November.
