GPNA Honors Sue Wilwerding as 2002 "Neighbor Of The Year"


The Gifford Park Neighborhood Association chose Sue Wilwerding as the "Neighbor of the Year" for 2002. The award was presented to Sue at the GPNA's 14th Annual Holiday Banquet hosted by Creighton University Medical Center on December 6. Usually we try to keep the award a surprise to the recipient but since Sue is involved in so many GPNA activities it would have been nearly impossible to keep it a secret from her.

Sue has been doing our neighborhood newsletter for the past 6 years (that's 12 issues/year X 6 years = 72 newsletters!). We had 6 different editors in the first 7 years of the GPNA. From the beginning, the newsletter has been the best communication tool and most important function of the neighborhood association. Anyone who has had the responsibility of newsletter editor knows this is a very challenging job.

The process to produce our monthly newsletter requires Sue to be involved, know what's going on in the neighborhood, attend most GPNA meetings and events, schedule her time to meet deadlines, get and write articles, incorporate photos, be accurate with information, deal with last minute changes, proofread, handle computer issues, and get the final copy of the document to Creighton University for printing. Once printed, we distribute the newsletter - during odd-numbered months 1,500 copies are hand-delivered by our dedicated volunteers to everyone within our GPNA boundaries; during even-numbered months 400 copies are mailed to GPNA members and people on our complimentary list. We have to time the newsletter printing and distributing so that the information gets into your hands before the first meeting each month. That's obviously a big responsibility to have each month for the past 6 years!

We're not the only ones who think Sue does a great job. Sibyl Myers who writes the "Backyard" column (neighborhood updates) for the Omaha World-Herald for 25 years, shared some of her thoughts about Sue and the newsletter. Sibyl says she "borrows" GPNA articles

Of course as president, he participated in most GPNA events and activities and ran our general membership and board meetings nearly every month over his term - this is not an easy task. Peter involved himself in a number of important issues affecting the neighborhood that required a lot of time and effort. As he mentioned above, it's not an easy job, especially when you consider it's an all—volunteer organization, but "you do get MORE out of it then you put into it". Peter, thanks for all your efforts and service for the GPNA, there's not many people that would have (or could have) taken on this responsibility to begin with. Good luck!

With 2003 here, I want us all to think about the opportunities we have to make a difference in our neighborhood. Please read the following events and activities we have planned for 2003 and let us know if you would be interested in helping in any way. Annual events include the Easter egg hunt, spring cleanup, Sun Dawgs (we hope!), Show Wagon, youth tennis program, neighborhood-wide garage sale, fall cleanup, pumpkin patch, haunted house, Holiday Banquet, caroling, and lighting contest. I also just got word that Gifford Park has been chosen to host "Music in the Park" in late August! Some other on-going activities include free tax help (during the tax season), neighborhood walks (spring through early fall), watch group patrol (every Friday and Saturday night), community garden, tool lending, general membership meetings (first Thursday of each month), board meetings (third Thursday of each month), newsletter distribution (odd-numbered months), and others.

Many of the events and activities listed above are things we have done for years, but we need new people and ideas to keep them interesting year after year. If none of the items above get you excited about getting involved, would you consider any of the following: writing a newsletter article or editorial; help make calls to neighborhood residents on upcoming events; participate on developing a neighborhood/business district master plan? Or how about sharing your ideas and talents with others in the neighborhood?





Bats In The Belfry

Are there bats in your belfry? Well, maybe not, but how about your attic or basement? Bats in your bedroom at night are s-c-a-a-a-a-r-y!

Actually, bats are very beneficial creatures who consume lots of flying insects in the summertime, but when the days get shorter and nights get colder, bats seek nice warm places for shelter and sometimes that is our homes. Hundreds of bats used to live in "Jobbers' Canyon" in downtown Omaha, but when most of the buildings were torn down, the bats moved west. The Gifford Park neighborhood with its big old trees was a perfect place for them.

Bats are almost blind and get around with a kind of sonar system. They swoop to collect insects. They do not attack people. They have no bone structure like other animals so they can squeeze into houses through very tiny openings.

Bob at the Nebraska Humane Society discussed bats with me and had some advice. If you have a bat in your home - - DON'T PANIC. Turn on the lights and you might find it clinging to your wall, curtains, drapes, or pictures. You can then capture it yourself while wearing a thick glove and picking the visitor off. Take it outside and let it go, or carefully move it into a plastic container or coffee can with lid and carry it outside. Be sure to wear a heavy glove because, if provoked, a bat can bite and a bat hite can be serious.

If you don't dare take the bat out yourself, call the Humane Society at 444-7804, ext. 1. They will send someone out to remove the creature. The Humane Society cannot hunt for bats in your home, but will gladly take one that can be seen. If the bat is in your bedroom, the Humane Society has an emergency service and will come as soon as they can, 24/7. Sometimes just by leaving a door open while the bat is flying, it will leave on its own, seeking fresh air. (The intruder will either fly out, or two more will fly in!)

Be aware that if you have a motion-sensitive alarm system, a bat can set it off just by flying past. Although bats generally sleep in cold weather, our recent warm days have awakened some bats and you could have an unwanted visitor!

Christmas Tree Recycling Information

The City of Omaha Public Works Department - Environmental Quality Division is once again providing collection sites for Christmas tree recycling (the trees will be ground into mulch). Christmas trees will not be collected as part of Omaha's garbage service. Volunteers will be available at the sites from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Jan. 4 & 5 for those who need assistance unloading trees. Please remove the following from the tree before bringing it to the collection site: nails, ornaments, plastic bags, wires, tree stands, and lights. Wreaths and evergreen roping, or wire-connected strands of evergreen will not be accepted. Flocked trees are acceptable. The following three sites closest to the Gifford Park area are:

Ak-Sar-Ben (South 69th St. and Mercy Road entrance - east of entrance gate - lot #6)

Orchard Park (66th Street north of Hartman Avenue)

Orchard Park (66th Street north of Hartman Avenue) Brown Park (U Street between 15th and 18th Streets)

The sites listed above will be open through January 12 - please do not deliver trees after this date. In addition, the City of Omaha Maintenance Facility at 11th and Locust Street will accept trees, but only from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on January 4 and 5. Share the Christmas spirit and ask a neighbor if you can help them get their tree to a recycling site. Thanks for making Christmas tree recycling part of your holiday tradition.

Snow Removal Information

A Snow Emergency means that no vehicles may be parked on the streets where you see an Emergency Snow Route sign. Crews will plow these streets first If cars are left parked on an Emergency Snow Route during a snow emergency, the cars will be subject to a fine and may be towed at the owner's expense. Radio and TV stations will broadcast all necessary information.

Omaha's Municipal Code requires all sidewalks to be shoveled within 24 hours after a snowstorm. Walks left unshoveled may be cleared by City crews at the expense of the property owner. For more information, or if you have a comment or complaint, please call the Street Maintenance Office at 444-4919 (24 hour line).
