### The Interim President's Column

I recently had the opportunity to listen to Marty Schukert, former City of Omaha Planning Director and principal of RDG Crose Gardner Shukert. Marty talked about community development in more than just the physical sense. Marty made these points about building a sense of community: 1. Neighborhoods should be physically safe and clean. 2. Neighborhoods should provide secure economic investment (homes and businesses). 3. Neighborhoods should offer life-enhancing opportunities and places, like special events and parks. 4. Neighborhoods should share and contribute their values and experiences to other neighborhoods. I believe our neighborhood association already strives for these.

Marty went on to talk about "Communitarianism", which is really a fancy word for neighborhoods to become more involved in the urban planning process. More specifically, it means supporting better design standards, promoting more vitality and diversity in our neighborhoods, and creating more linkages between neighborhoods (like walk/bike trail systems). What I took from his talk is that our neighborhood is doing a lot of things right, but we have a lot to work on to reach our potential. As we discussed at our April GPNA general meeting, everyone's participation in the Destination Midtown master planning process will be critical to see real improvement in our area. This opportunity for residents and business owners to help shape the future of our own neighborhood does not happen very often.

The GPNA applied for two grants, the Omaha Community Foundation (\$2,500) and the Mayor's Neighborhood grants (\$5,000). We focused on improvements for Gifford Park. Between the two grants we asked for 10 new park benches, fall cleanup funding, and supplemental entertainment funding for the two Show Wagon events. Also a facet of the grant is for volunteers to help do a few small projects in the park, including expanding the tennis backboard, painting the old swingset, and painting line games on the blacktop. Please contact us if you are interested in helping.

And finally, I wanted to mention some people who recently, in very different ways, demonstrated their commitment to this neighborhood. First of all Jan Franks did a great job with our Easter Egg hunt, and along with a ton of candy donations from David Staenberg and the Wolf House, made this another successful event. Ron Yates probably saved a man from further injury or worse as a result of the man being shot on Easter Sunday morning near 33rd & Webster. Ron acted quickly to stop serious bleeding and called 911. He also reviewed our 33rd & California video surveillance tape to most likely identify the vehicle involved in the shooting. And the GPNA thanks Ron Frey, Cynthia Shuck, Eve Randone and Vicki Frey for volunteering to be our slate of officers for the June elections – we greatly appreciate your commitment.

# City Councilman Addresses Noise Issue

The GPNA received a letter from Jim Vokal, City Council Representative, concerning the issue of loud stereo or "boom box" noise in various neighborhoods within the district. He stated that he had recently met with the Southeast Police Precinct Captain to discuss this matter and to determine the best ways of dealing with these disturbances. As a result of these discussions, Mr. Vokal recommended the following actions be taken to help this situation:

- Citizens with a complaint should continue to call 911 (records are established when a call is made).
- If practical, citizens should request the offending party to reduce the noise. This is not always practical or possible but if done, it establishes for a judge that an attempt was made. Make a record/note for yourself for later reference.
- Police officers can ticket offenders when they observe the offense. However, if not observed, the citizen can file a complaint and the officer will write the ticket based on the citizen complaint. The citizen may be required to appear in court later.
- The police department will make noise disturbances a "focused item" this spring. Officers will be instructed on giving verbal warnings and/or issuing tickets. Citizens lodging complaints may be contacted for assistance.

Mr. Vokal explained that he will continue to work within the legislative process to find a solution and discuss with the City Prosecutor the value of strengthening police enforcement and other actions as necessary to reduce this noise issue.

Helping Hands is a program designed by Keep Omaha Beautiful, Inc. to help elderly and disabled citizens with a free, one time yard clean up which includes raking, litter and limb pick up, and weed pulling (mowing optional if the equipment is available). A Memorial Day ceremony is set for May 26th at Prospect Hill Cemetery, 3202 Parker St. A concert by the Preservation Brass Ensemble will begin at 10:40 a.m. with the program beginning at 11 a.m. Dr. Orville Menard, who has just completed a book entitled "From Rulo To Lynch With Lewis & Clark", will be the speaker. Bring lawn chairs or blankets and enjoy this fitting way to experience the occasion. Parking is available inside the cemetery.



# "Hard Time For Gun Crime" Is Program's Theme

Project Safe Neighborhoods is a nation-wide offensive to put criminals in prison who illiegally use or possess guns. Every community in America along with federal, state, and local law enforcement are working together to get gun wielding criminals off America's streets. Today, if you are caught using or possessing a gun in violation of the law, you will go straight to prison. If you're caught with a gun you cannot legally possess, you will face harsh penalties in federal prison with NO POSSIBILITY OF PAROLE. And, if you have three or more prior violent felony or serious drug offense convictions, you face a minimum of 15 years in prison without parole.

Whether or not you have ever been convicted of any crime, if you use, brandish, display, carry, or possess a firearm in a way designed to further or carry out a drug-trafficking crime or a federal crime of violence, you can be charged - in addition to the crime itself - with a federal firearms crime. In fact, you can be convicted of this offense even if the gun is not on you! The lightest sentence you can get for this crime is 5 years minimum, with no parole. The sentence must be served in addition to any other sentence for the drug-trafficking or violent crime. And, if you are convicted of having a gun during a second violent crime or drug-trafficking offense - even during the same trial - you're automatically going to prison for at least 30 years.

Other facts concerning illegal gun use: 1) if you steal guns or have anything to do with guns that you know or have reasonable cause to believe were stolen, you can go to prison for up to 10 years 2) possessing or discharging a firearm in a school zone can get you a prison sentence of up to five years 3) obliterating or altering the manufacturer's serial number on a firearm - or even transporting or possessing such a firearm - is punishable by up to five years in prison 4) as of September 13, 1994, making a semiautomatic assault weapon is against the law. It is also illegal to transfer or possess any semiautomatic assault weapon made after that date. The sentence? Up to five years in prison 5) Making or possessing a machine gun, sawed-off shotgun or rifle, silencer, or destructive device without registration through the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives can result in a 10 year prison term.

Who is prohibited from possessing any kind of gun or ammunition? Convicted felons, fugitives from justice, drug traffickers or users, illegal aliens or

aliens that are on temporary status, persons determined to be mentally deficient or incompetent or committed to mental institutions, people who have formally given up their U.S. citizenship, people who have been dishonorably discharged from the Armed Service, and people involved in committing domestic violence, such as anyone subject to a protection order, or who has been conviced of a crime of violence against an intimate partner. You have committed a crime and can go to federal prison if you help anyone in one of these categories get a gun or ammunition (even if you yourself are not in one of the categories). It may not matter if you knew the person was in one of the groups; if you buy a gun for someone else and lie on the federal form about who the gun is for, you have committed a federal crime.

Project Safe Neighborhoods wants your help. If you know of a felon, drug dealer, or other individual possessing an illegal firearm, CALL 444-STOP. If your anonymous tip leads to an illegal gun arrest, you could be eligible for an IMMEDIATE \$250 REWARD.

To help you get it going, City Sprouts is sponsoring its Fourth Annual Growing for Market seminar series at the UNMC Office Complex, Annex 4 located at the northwest corner of 38th Avenue and Leavenworth Streets.

The first seminar is Saturday, May 3, and the second is Saturday, May 10, both running from 9:00 AM to 12:00 PM. The topic is "Organic Gardening." Tom Thomas, veteran market gardener, educator and professional organic farm certifier, will discuss and show participants how to plan a garden for consumption and profit. By attending both seminars, participants will learn how to organically grow fresh produce and market that produce directly to consumers through farmers markets and other venues. Afternoon site visits to Omaha community gardens for hands-on practice will follow the morning sessions each Saturday. The site visit location will be announced at the seminar. Topics covered during the seminar include: growing for market techniques, sustainable gardening, pest management, harvesting, and organic gardening skills. The cost is \$10 for both sessions of the seminar series. Each registered participant will receive some seeds or transplants for their gardens, at no additional charge. 
