
Neighborhood Block Party August 5

Mark your calendars and help celebrate the 20th annual National Night Out, Tuesday, August 5, 5:30 to 8 p.m. at 33rd & California. 33rd Street will be blocked off from California to Cass for the event. EVERYONE is welcome to participate and have a good time. It's a great opportunity to get together and show your support for our neighborhood in a big way.

Citizens and law enforcement will be working together to heighten crime and drug prevention awareness, generate support for, and participation in, local anti-crime programs, strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships, and send a message to criminals, letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

The theme again this year is "Dusk 'til Dawn, Leave Your Lights On!" This theme serves as a reminder that maintaining a well-lit neighborhood by leaving outdoor lights on all night is one of the simplest, yet most effective, crime deterrents at our disposal, and it's not expensive.

We plan to have many of the same activities as last year's event, including food, ice cream, refreshments, Jazz music, parade, a firetruck and classic cars on display, face painting, a rock-climbing wall and moonwalk, hoop-it-up 3 on 3 basketball, information booths (health, safety, neighborhood), and much more. 


Sun Dawgs Have A Great Summer In Gifford Park

From The President . . .

I don't know if you've noticed, but our neighborhood is made up of little circles. You can see these circles everywhere. Anywhere people gather is a circle of communication. There's the circle that might gather around back yard fences to discuss gardening or yard care. Or, you might find a gathering at someone's front porch, or on the sidewalk, a corner, or in the alley. Your circle might be more formal, like the Community Garden participants, or very informal, like a group playing cards at California Tacos.

You may be involved in more than one circle in the neighborhood—in fact, most of us are. There might be a group of neighbors you talk to regularly. There may be another group of people in the neighborhood you work with or go to school with. These multiple circles interconnect us as a neighborhood. I believe that this network is integral to the success of Gifford Park. It is like a shirt of chainlink mail that creates strength and protection for all of us.

What do you talk about in your circles? You may discuss old home repair, or what to do about grub worms. Or, your group may talk about people or neighborhood problems. I know mine do. We might complain about a civic or neighborhood leader. Some of us point out how the city does or doesn't do this or that. I've observed that some cities do things ours doesn't. On occasion, we all need an outlet. Circles sometimes can help us express those feelings and move on.

I encourage you, though, to check the "negativity meter" in your group once in a while. The thing I've concluded about being negative is that it can become paralyzing. Sometimes it can be a crutch or an excuse. Have you ever noticed that the loudest complainer is often the one who does the least? Focusing on the negative often does not produce results.

The legacy I hope to leave is the positive. I believe Gifford Park is a GREAT place to live! I'm realistic enough to realize that there are issues and problems. Our resources and time are limited. I don't know about you, but I spend a great deal of my time trying to scrape out a living. I don't have a lot of time or money to devote to the enormous task of fixing all things wrong with Gifford Park neighborhood. I know you probably don't either.

But I do have a little time. I hope you do too! I have a few ideas, I hope you do too! I place a challenge before you and your circles: What small, positive contribution can you and your circle "own" that can make a difference for your neighborhood? You and your circle may come up with a plan and work it out!

For example, some of us met a week or so ago, to clean up the park. You know what I learned? It is a lot easier to clean the park before the city mows on Tuesdays than afterwards! Maybe your circle wants to help clean the park. Maybe you have a great idea for a social activity that your circle wants to help sponsor. Let's get our circles networking with each other and make a difference!

Destination Midtown: Upcoming Public Workshops

The public meetings held in early July were once again well attended and some very good visioning ideas were discussed. It would be nice to see greater attendance and participation from GPNA members. With the "meat" of the project coming up, here's your chance as HDR will facilitate important public workshops with the following descriptions and planned timelines:

Workshop #1: Comprehensive/area-wide issues such as mobility, parks, open spaces, etc. (tentatively 4 days, last week in August)

Workshop #2: Neighborhood expo/symposium (code enforcement, crime, rehabilitation, etc.) and discussion of resources that are available to the neighborhoods within the study area (tentatively end of September)

Workshop #3: Design charrette for the core area (Dodge to Leavenworth, Saddle Creek to 24th St.) focusing on areas and issues derived from Workshops #1 & #2 (tentatively mid-November)

Following these workshops, HDR will prepare the master plan documents, review and revise the documents, and produce final documents by next spring. As has been communicated all along, everyone's input and participation is vital to this master planning process, and there are many opportunities over the next few months for you to help shape the future of our neighborhoods.
