From The President . . .

Be on the alert! Captain **Denise Cousin** of the Northeast Police Precinct has notified us that they have been seeing a rise in burglaries recently. Apparently, a wave of burglaries started in the northwest precinct area, around Dundee, Country Club and Benson, and has been working its way east.

This is an issue where we as residents can be the eyes and ears of our officers. I don't know if you saw in the news about how one individual, who was involved in a citizen's patrol group, stopped a burglary ring single-handedly. He observed some men with a truck, and their activities looked suspicious. He called the police, they came and arrested the men and closed down the ring.

Particular areas the police department is especially watchful of is east of Saddle Creek and south of Cuming. Burglaries seem to be happening mostly in the morning, right after people go to work, particularly on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. No violence has been reported with any incident.

Most of us think that these things happen at night, or on holidays. We need to be watchful during the daytime as well. Don't be nosy, but be a good, watchful neighbor. If you hear unusual noises, or see unusual things, take the time to check it out. By seeing something, and calling 911, you might become a neighborhood hero and stop a crime syndicate. You may wish to participate in a citizens patrol at a time convenient for you. Let me know if you are interested.

That reminds me of a story about my own experience with burglary. We lived in an apartment in Southern California with a big picture window to the street, years ago. We made a quick ice cream run to the mall before it closed. When we returned home, I noticed the door was ajar. I didn't remember leaving the door open, so I was afraid that there still might be someone inside. We went next door and asked our neighbors if they heard anything, because someone broke into our apartment. My neighbor wanted to help me check it out. But first, he got his Western style, "6-shooter" pistol! He stuck it in the back of his pants and said, "Let's go." I was more afraid of him than of what might be in our apartment! As it turned out, only our small TV, microwave and a typewriter were taken (and some of my jeans and sweaters).

The point of this story was that we were gone such a short time that the burglar must have been watching. When you leave your home, don't just rush off. Take a look around. Occasionally, drive around the block and go by your house again, just for a second look. The other issue is that we thought by putting a board in our sliding window track, we were secure. The burglar, however, just popped a hole in the window, reached in, rolled the board out of the track and slid the window open.

Some of the safety measures you have for your house might not be as effective as you might think. That is why the police officers of the Midwest Guardians at the Northeast Precinct are willing to give Gifford Park residents a free safety inspection of your home. I think this would be a great opportunity to let a different set of "professional eyes" give you tips on making your property more secure. GPNA Receives Mayor's Grant


Great news! The GPNA was awarded \$5,000 from Mayor Fahey's Mayor's Grant program. This was announced in a press conference in Bemis Park, Wednesday, June 30. Gifford Park worked together with Bemis Park Neighborhood Association to submit joint proposals to bring Big Muddy Workshop in for a study of green spaces.

This will be a continuation project for Big Muddy Workshop. Last year, they provided planning for Leavenworth and Dewey Parks on the park and boulevard system south of Turner Park. Continuing the project on the northern part of the system will give the necessary continuity to enhance the entire system. The abandoned interstate bridges over 30th Street will be taken out in the next few years. This will open up the possibility to restore a portion of Turner Park, north of Dodge Street. Planning needs to be done for that parcel of land. There is a great opportunity to spearhead the Destination Midtown recommendation of establishing green corridors along 30th Street, 33rd Street, Davenport and California Streets.

The goal is threefold. The first is to make green connections between Bemis Park, Gifford Park and Turner Park. Second is to restore the Park and Boulevard system in our neighborhood. Third is to provide a green connection between our central business district and the major employers in the area, such as Mutual of Omaha and Creighton University Medical Center. Everyone will get a chance to participate in this planning process as it unfolds this summer. Stay tuned for more details to come. We think these plans will build excitement amongst our residents and major institutional partners about the Gifford Park/Bemis Park area.

Several GPNA members took the time to reflect on their experiences with Ruth and what she meant to the GPNA community:

Ruth was one of the most giving, dedicated people you could ever know. Her contributions to the GPNA are remarkable. During the late 1980's and into the 1990's Ruth, along with other dedicated people, was involved in organizing and leading many of the events and activities we enjoy today. The list includes newsletter editor, treasurer, recording secretary, membership, social activities, Easter Egg hunt, garage sale, cleanups, bike rodeo, Watch Group, Show Wagon, holiday banquet, park improvements and other valuable activities. While her husband Jim was the GPNA's first president starting in 1989, Ruth's support of Jim and the GPNA made it possible for these good things to happen in our neighborhood. I personally draw strength and motivation from my early experiences with both Jim and Ruth because they challenged me in a positive way and always took the time to help, even if it wasn't convenient for them. Our thoughts are with Jim and his family.

I first met Ruth back in the late 1970's. She was very active in the Henry W. Yates Elementary School PTA. Ruth was an integral part of a group of parents who participated in bake sales, ice cream socials, fundraisers, school programs, and the yearly carnivals at Yates. If there was something that needed to get done, she was always one of those caring parents who could be counted on to help. She served as President of the Yates PTA a couple of times, and when it looked like the PTA was about ready to fold,

due to lack of parent participation, she and Jim helped keep the PTA going.

I recall fondly, during the early days of the GPNA, that our first two or three garage sales were held in Bogard's drugstore, (now California Tacos). Ruth and some helpers gathered tons of children's clothing for weeks before the sale, and they washed and neatly folded each of the hundreds of items. Several members' washing machines and dryers were working overtime for days before the garage sale. The idea was to provide funds for the GPNA, but at the same time have on hand some nice things for the children of the



Habitat For Humanity Builds Home in Neighborhood

Seeing new home construction in this neighborhood is somewhat of an unusual sight, but that is exactly what is happening at 708 North 33rd Street. Habitat for Humanity, in conjunction with Mutual of Omaha and St. Cecilia's Cathedral Parish, is building a new home for June Fritz, who is a single mother of two. Selected out of nearly 160 applicants to receive the house, Fritz was suprised not only to be chosen to get the house, but also to know that Mutual of Omaha, her former employer for 12 years, donated \$50,000 for the construction of the 1350 sq.ft. house, and members of her own parish. St. Cecilia's, were helping her build it.

Habitat for Humanity's mission is "building homes and building them through our community spirit and material resources." Since 1976, the organization has built more than 50,000 houses with families throughout the United States. According to Nancy Hemesath, executive director of Habitat for Humanity, they do not "give away houses" - instead, the organization sells houses at no profit with no interest charged on 25 to 30-year mortgages. The homeowners and volunteers build the houses under trained supervision, and individuals, corportations, faith groups, and others provide financial support. Volunteers do all the construction work on the house except for those projects that require a licensed professional, such as electrical, heating, and plumbing work. Selections of potential homeowners are based on need. They must be low-income, have reasonably good credit, a willingness to work 350 hours on the house, and the ability to pay with a regular source of income.

Volunteers began working on the house June 5, spending Saturdays and some Sundays hammering nails and putting up walls. The home should be completed by mid-August. GPNA members Mike Wilwerding and Marc Talkington were among the many volunteers at the site. (Information for this article was provided courtesy of Lisa Schulte from The Catholic Voice.)



Historically Speaking . . . Ronald Reagan's Boots

GPNA newspaper readers might have noticed the Omaha connection during the state funeral of former president Ronald Reagan, but did you know, there is also a Gifford Park connection? According to the Omaha World-Herald and TV accounts, the boots that were placed backward in the stirrups of the riderless horse were made by the 79-year old Dehner Boot Company of Omaha.

The Dehner Company, headed by C.C. Dehner, moved to Omaha from Wichita, Kansas, in 1929. During the 30's, Dehner lived at 142 North 34th St. His daughter and son-in-law, Gladys and Harold Ketzler, with son Donovan and daughter Janne (now deceased), lived on North 34th Street and on North 31st Street between Davenport and Dodge until 1938 when they moved to J.E. George Blvd. Both Donovan and Janne attended Henry Yates Elementary School. Mrs. Ketzler was the leader of a Camp Fire Girls group from Yates school. Janne and I were the same age and shared many Camp Fire activities. Mrs. Ketzler had many interesting ideas for young girls and we had a fun time at their home.

Harold Ketzler was head of the Dehner business until 1971 when Donovan Ketzler took over. Since 1991, Harold's grandson, Jeff, has been CEO. They make high quality hand-made custom boots for equestrians and motorcyclists. They had made boots for Reagan since about 1946. Other celebrity customers have included Jackie Onassis, Dwight Eisenhower, and George Patton. They also make boots for NASA, Aggie Boots for Texas A & M, and the "SAC Boot" worn by Thunderbird and test pilots. Omaha mounted police have also worn Dehner boots. A 1998 article in the New Horizons newspaper stated that Dehners turns out about 12,000 pairs of boots a year. Not bad for a firm with roots in Gifford Park!

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

Weeds...How Tall Is Too Tall?

City of Omaha code states that weeds (or any vegetation) cannot be over 18" tall. The following steps can be taken if this code is violated:

- A complaint can be filed by anyone
- A City Inspector will send the property owner a 10 day notice to cut the weeds
- If the owner does not respond, the address is put on a mowing list
- Property will be mowed and the owner will be charged according to the size of job
