Maybe you have a concern about housing quality in our neighborhood. Have you observed properties that have significantly contributed to the decline of our neighborhood? Do you want to learn about available resources to help low income or elderly with housing issues? Or are you curious as to what constitutes a code violation? Then join us for the Gifford Park Neighborhood Scan Seminar on Saturday, June 18, 8:30 am to 10:30 am at Creighton University Medical Center, Dining Room D.

Dr. Russ Smith from the University of Nebraska at Omaha will lead the session. He will demonstrate the use of the "pocket PC" and will train us on how to evaluate our housing stock, based on the housing code. We would like to form teams who could then help in a scanning project for the entire Gifford Park Neighborhood.

This scan will help us understand the quality of our neighborhood housing stock, provide tools for education and grant opportunities, and will give us a basis to communicate back to neighborhood property owners on our findings. From The President . . .

Downtown redevelopment is increasing the housing pressure in the downtown area. Gallup built a new headquarters at the riverfront. First National increased their profile with a new tower. Union Pacific consolidated employees into a new headquarters. Creighton University is aggressively working on its master plan. While the Qwest Center and the new Holland Performing Arts Center won't be large centers of employment, they serve to increase attention to the downtown area.

With housing needs come solutions. A recent article in the World-Herald detailed all the building renovations happening downtown. In addition to the Brandeis building and the Paxton, there are also new condo developments emerging on Leavenworth, near the Durham Western Heritage Museum. One only hopes that someone will rescue the old Union Pacific building and find a quality use for it.

In this climate we received news from our neighbor to the south, Mutual of Omaha. They plan a 90 million dollar investment in condominiums and shops on the southeast corner of 33rd & Dodge. That is right at our front door and can bring a number of new residents and customers to our area.

This dovetails with our desire, as a neighborhood, to help people rediscover living in the city. But how can we ride the coat tails? What can we do to see our housing stock improve, to have a healthy real estate market and a thriving neighborhood?

Our short-term goals are very simple. We have been seeking funding to implement gateway features at 30th & California and 33rd & Dodge, to introduce our neighborhood to those outside. Mutual of Omaha is very interested in seeing a Gifford Park gateway at 33rd & Dodge to complement their development. We also will be embarking on a street tree-planting project over the next two years to beautify our streets.

But to have real change is going to take vision, vigilance, and investment. Vision asks, what are the possibilities? When we look at the variety of homes, we have to see potential even in the tiny shotgun house. We have to market that vision to everyone: realtors, bankers, employers, landlords, and potential homeowners. We have to convince them that these properties are worth significant investment.

Vigilance was the motivation that initially created this neighborhood association. Public safety, nuisance enforcement, and code issues are the proverbial holes in the dike that we need to plug with as many fingers as possible. I've had some who expressed concern about our desire to scan the entire neighborhood. But we have to consider the cost of not taking action against significant code violation. A neighborhood isn't static; it is a living organism. If serious disease isn't addressed it can endanger its viability.

Investment. What more can I say? It is unpredictable and unwieldy. It doesn't come when you want it and it is hard to control when it comes. Quality investment never comes when there is no vision and no vigilance. If we don't promote a clear picture of what could be and don't take care of our back yard, then we won't capture the quality investment we seek. If the perceptions of our neighborhood don't change and money flows to other neighborhoods besides our own, we will have no one to blame but ourselves. Blame is passive and we can't afford, at this stage, to be passive. We have to be the ones to take ownership of our future.

I'm nearing the end of my term of office. Some could argue that nothing is different than before, we're no better off. Maybe that's the case as I'm only continued on page 6



Report From The State Capitol

My first legislative session is rapidly coming to a close so I wanted to update you on what has been going on in your Legislature.

The end of the session has been very busy with late nights as we try to get as many bills heard before adjournment after 90 days. The end of the session has been dominated by consideration of the 2005-07 Biennial State Budget which totals \$6.1 billion. This includes a 9% increase in state aid to education. We got good economic news this year with revenues running better than previously projected.

We are currently working on a methamphetamine bill that would restrict access to over-the-counter cold medications that are used to make methamphetamine. The use of this very addictive drug is a growing problem in Nebraska. The Legislature spent many hours working on a couple of economic incentive bills to create more jobs in Nebraska. One priority of mine is that businesses that receive these tax breaks provide affordable health insurance for these new jobs. I support the provisions of this legislation that provides more transparency for the public about where these state incentives are going and what kind of jobs are being created.

Another economic incentive bill that has been of interest to me is LB 500, the Entertainment and Tourism Development Act. This bill has been mentioned as a possible tool for the construction of a downtown baseball stadium for the Omaha Royals. I offered an amendment that prohibits any entity using this tax break from charging for parking. I feel strongly that taxpayers should not have to pay more money to park in a facility they helped pay for; it is just a matter of fairness.

Finally, I want to thank all of the students that sent art work to be displayed in my office in the State Capitol during this semester. I heard many wonderful compliments about the quality of the work. The schools that provided art work were Dundee, Washington, J.P. Lord, UNO Child Care and Central High School. I am looking forward to more art work next session.

Nebraska Homestead Exemption

Are you interested in getting a reduction in your property taxes? If you are 65 years or older and are permanently disabled, or a widow(er) of certain veterans, you could be eligible for a reduction in your property taxes. For individuals 65 and older, your income must be less than \$27,351 if you are single or less than \$32,251 if married to qualify. Destination Midtown, United Way of the Midlands, UNO's School of Social Work and Volunteers Intervening for Equity (VIE) are partnering to provide free assistance on the Homestead Exemption applications in June. Free assistance will be available from 6 to 8 p.m. on the first three Thursdays in June. The sites are: First Central Congregational Church at 421 So. 36th St. on June 2; St. Cecilia's Grade School Library at 3869 Webster St. on June 9; and First Presbyterian Church at 216 So. 34th St. on June 16. Please bring any un-reimbursed medical expenses including insurance premiums, your 2004 tax return, 1099 forms, and a completed Nebraska Homestead Exemption Application (call 444-7185 for an application).
